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NEW REVOLT IN SPAIN IS ANTICIPATED

MUTINY IN ARMY STILL THREATENS

London Newspaper Man Tells of Visit to Country

DE RIVERA FIRM

King's Abdication With Queen as Regent Suggested Only Remedy

LONDON, Sept. 17.—A special reporter of the Daily Express, who has been in Spain investigating the situation, and the recent crisis due to the mutiny of the artillery corps, telegraphs from Hendaya a lurid picture of events. He asserts that the mutiny continues to grow in the army, and that a fresh upheaval is expected.

DICTATOR'S THREAT

Arriving at the palace in Madrid, Alfonso received the Premier, General Primo De Rivera, to whom he related the conversation of the officers at Del Leon.

PEOPLE IN IGNORANCE

"If revolution comes," the correspondent continues, "it will through the army and not the people, who are not allowed to know what is happening. Their potential leaders, the intellectuals, are being rounded up and imprisoned for fear of their influence."

SOLUTION SUGGESTED

The writer quotes an unnamed intellectual as saying: "The only chance for the salvation of Spain lies in the hope that Alfonso will abdicate in favor of his third son (Prince Juan, 18 years old), with Queen Victoria as regent until the Prince attains his majority."

BUSINESS SUFFERS

The correspondent asserts that civil justice and liberty are mere mockery in the Spain of today. Business is coming to a standstill. Primo De Rivera is pressing hard for money and imposing his right on the left. The people, restless owing to taxation, who base their hopes on repaying benefits from the campaign in Morocco, are doomed, as there is authoritative information that Primo De Rivera is negotiating with an American group for the sale of Moroccan citizens.
