BUSINESS METHODS

Another part of the Romance of Rotary was a new understanding of the ethics of business. The Rotary business methods program began in 1910. Its real impetus had been given in the last four or five years. As never before in the history of modern business, men were focusing their attention upon the standardization of business ethics. Last year, he presented the program of the business methods committee to the board of Rotary International. It contained four program suggestions: First, Codes correct practices and craft; second, the relation between buyer and seller; third, the relationship between competitors.

PROBLEMS

The great problem of Rotary at present was the tremendous growth of Rotary. Rotary had doubled in number in the last five years, since the Atlantic City convention. Today there were 2,307 Rotary clubs throughout the world, with a total membership of 118,000. Already this year there had been elected to membership in Rotary in the United States, Canada and Newfoundland 142 new Rotary clubs. A little idea of the growth could be shown in the Rotary. In 1916 the budget for the Rotary was \$28,000. In 1926, the advertising in the Rotary will amount to \$10,000, with a total budget of \$220,000. This tremendous growth brought with it small problems. There was the problem of the small club. President Harding, at St. Louis, said, "If I could I would place a Rotary club in every community throughout the world and I would guarantee the future peace and union of the world." This was their great of modern business.
