

**BODY OF CAPTAIN
WILL BE EXHUMED**

Magistrate Appointed to Investigate French Officer's Death.

Paris, April 18.—There have been fresh developments in connection with the death of Captain Robinot-Murcy, an examining magistrate having been appointed to unravel the mystery. His first step was to order the captain's body exhumed. No doubt the magistrate desires to satisfy himself as to the type of bullet which caused death—whether the cartridge in the army revolver was one forgotten by the captain, or whether it might not have been placed there by a third person.

It now appears that no quarrel or even discussion took place between the captain and Mme. D. According to the statement of the latter's husband, what occurred was as follows:—
The captain was to have attended a masked ball with M. and Mme. D. on the evening of the tragedy. The captain had chosen the costume of a brigand from an Offenbach opera. Returning home from the Ecole de Guerre in good spirits, he met Mme. M. at her flat and showed her the costume. Pointing to a huge pistol lying on the table, he said: "Do you think I will look sufficiently 'scary'?" Mme. D. laughingly replied: "You might choose a still bigger pistol." The captain then showed her his army revolver. Madame D., frightened, begged him to put it away, but the captain laughed and said: "There is no danger, I hold the pistol to my temple and pressed the trigger. A forgotten cartridge in the magazine went off, killing an unfortunate officer."
That is the husband's version, but the magistrate does not appear satisfied that it is the true one, and the investigations are being continued.

SCOTLAND DEATH RATE HIGH

In the week ended Jan. 21, 379 deaths from influenza were recorded in sixteen principal towns of Scotland. The population of these towns is 2,370,000. This gives an influenza death rate for the week, on an unusual basis, of 8.39 per thousand population. One thousand nine hundred and thirty deaths from all causes were reported in the week, the crude death rate being 42.5 per thousand. The Health Service quotes the Registrar General of Scotland, in the weekly return of births, deaths and marriages in the principal towns of Scotland, as saying:—
"The death rate for the week is 15.8 above that for the previous week, 22.8 above the mean of the rates for the three preceding weeks, and 28.9 above that for the corresponding week of last year. It is the highest principal town weekly death rate since that of the week ended March 2, 1919, which was 42.8 in the influenza epidemic of 1918-19 the highest corresponding death rate was 40.0, and occurred in the week ended March 1, 1919."
"In the individual towns the death rate ranged from 55.6 in Glasgow, 50.9 in Coatbridge, and 48.7 in Kilmarnock, to 11.6 in Ayr, 17.3 in Motherwell, and 17.6 in Clydebank. In Dundee it was 41.1, in Edinburgh 35.1, in Falkirk 34.4, in Paisley 33.7, in Perth
