### Unity and Enthusiasm In Interests of the Port And the Board of Trade

Much enthusiasm and unity of spirit was shown by the representative gathering of citizens at the get-together luncheon held under the auspices of the St. John Board of Trade, last evening in Pythian Hall, Union street, when prominent speakers voiced their views on harbor commission and other questions of the day of interest to St. John and a strong bid was made for better support, by the citizens in general, of the board of trade. It was the date for a monthly meeting of the board, but regular business was suspended. The singing of "O Canada" was the first feature of the gathering and then more than three hundred sat down to a substantial luncheon furnished by Bond's. President Burditt, on behalf of the board of trade, extended a hearty welcome to those present, and hoped those not members would become so. He said that it was a non-exclusive, non-acctarian, non-political body, which had the well being of the city for its aim. The door was now open for membership and he trusted that the spirit of self sacrifice and service born of the war would long actuate the people of St. John. The boards of trade were recognized by the government as the representatives of the commercial interests of the cities. He told of the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the British Empire, held in Toronto. It was an impressive gathering, and showed how the board of trade was recognized as the representative of the people. The local organization should have a large membership to be truly representative and the object of the present gathering was to enlarge the membership. He told of the board being formed in 1821 and said that it had always been composed of public spirited citizens working in the interests of the city and port. The present members should carry on the torth. "Let us not fail," he continued.
