NEARLY 400 SHELLS

French Investigator Says 3,-690,000 Fell on French Front in Five Months.

Paris, April 23—Dr. Mercer, of the French Academy of Medicine, after an extended investigation, has determined that during five months of 1917, 3,690,000 shells fell on the front of the three French armies. He says they killed 13,265 men and wounded 55,412. According to his figures it took 395 shells to kill one man and half as many to wound one.
