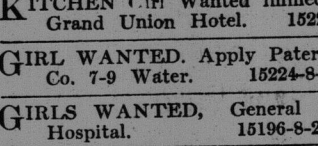

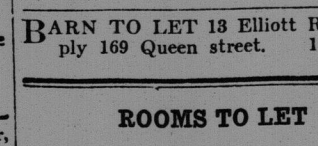

LA MARQUISE DE FONTENAY

Noted German Ironmaster Who
is Hard Hit by War—The
New Royal Babe

August Thyssen, a veteran German
ironmaster and one of the most power-
ful captains of industry in the Teuton
Empire, has been hard hit by the pres-
ent war, which he declares could have
been avoided, if England had been rep-
resented at the peace conference at the
president of some great steamship
company and if Germany had been in
the same way represented at the court
of St. James by some great Rheinisch-
Westphalian iron master or manu-
facturer.

An ardent advocate of the interna-
tionalism of commerce, he possesses huge
mises, ironworks, docks, and even har-
bors in British India, France and in
Russia, all of which have now been taken
possession of by the governments of
these three countries as property be-
longing to the German enemy; while if
Holland, as Germany's ally, in spite of
her endeavors to preserve her neu-
trality, she newly acquired docks and
shipbuilding yards, will likewise be lost to
him.

These he secured through the agency
of the German legation at the Hague,
in behalf of the Vulcan Iron and Ship-
building Company, which he owns, and
has given a contract for the construction
of a large new harbor, with a
depth of twenty-seven feet, also ir-
revocable to hold a battleship
and huge wharves. He likewise has ar-
ranged for the building of a lofty wall
round the entire property, so as to en-
sure complete privacy, the inference
naturally being that it was intended not
so much for commercial purposes, as
for the repairing and coaling of German
warships.

His mines and ironworks in France
are situated at Montigny and Maisieres,
while his headquarters are his docks in
France are at Gen. His principal base
in Russia is at Nikolai, on the Black
Sea, where he owns virtually everything
in sight. He admits that England is the
rival of the world's markets, but his
views considered that they could mean
rivals without becoming foes. Indeed,
he has strongly favored a policy of
peace between them, and has argued
that political friendship would inevitably
follow in its wake. He has been
the ground that specific Anglo-German
agreements regulating prices of great
staples like coal, and iron, and
shipping conventions, were of much
more vital significance and practical
value than mere treaties of political
lines, and advocated a scheme whereby
each country should confine itself to
specialties, and so spend money in
fields have yielded 15,000,000 tons of

Half Million Dependent on Him
August Thyssen, now about seventy-
five, is a self-made man, having started
in the late sixties with a capital of \$6-
000, with which he obtained control of
a rolling mill employing sixty workmen.
When the present war broke out he
worked in Germany alone numbered
more than 50,000 and their wives and
children brought the total of people
dependent upon him in Germany
and more or less under his control, up
to a quarter of a million, not counting
the vast number of his subjects in
potash salts.

He insists that the secret of his suc-
cess is his adherence to the principle of
industrial concentration, and his belief
in trusts as factors for preventing trade
crises is very pronounced. He himself
founded Germany's leading coal com-
pany, the steel, the coal, and the pig-
iron trusts. He calls the cheapening of
the cost of living the greatest of evils
to the people, and he advocates a scheme
whereby each country should confine itself
to specialties, and so spend money in

Thyssen is a great character in his
way, and is utterly devoid of ostenta-
tion. The motto on his coat-of-arms
"If I rule I must" illustrates his atti-
tude. He is the hardest worker of
his thousands upon thousands of em-
ployes.

In the glorious old castle, high up on
the wooded slopes of the river Ruhr,
where he makes his principal residence,
he has a great work-room, immediately
adjoining his bed-room, and may be
found there at all hours of the day and
night, directing his vast operations. His
life is of the simplest. In fact, it might
almost be described as austere, and no-
body has ever seen him in a suit of
clothes that could have cost more than
\$20. Very reticent, he never talks unless
he has something to say, and this he says
with a minimum expenditure of voca-
bulary. Yet he speaks several of the
foreign languages with remarkable flu-
ency, notably English. He is very good
at his army of workmen, but declines to
coddle them, but shuns society, loves
Nature, is deeply religious, and a de-
vout member of the Catholic Church.

He received his business training at
Antwerp, where he spent his early days.
His one great sorrow in life is his
feud with his son, August, who has been
twice bankrupted, with debts of some
\$12,000,000, and who has served sentences
in prison, both for duelling and for libel-
ing some of his father's friends and chief
legitimate liabilities of \$4,000,000, and
to assure him an allowance of \$80,000 a
year, beyond the reach of his other cred-
itors, if he would renounce his rights to
his legal share in the inheritance of the
fortunes of his father, after the latter's
death.

But young Thyssen, who is perhaps
the greatest, and certainly the most
widely known spendthrift in Germany,
has treated the proposal with derision,
declaring the allowance of \$80,000 a year

to be a mere pittance, totally inadequate
for his wants, and that it would be ridi-
culous under the circumstances to re-
nounce his big inheritance for any such
trifling consideration. He has suggested
in return that his father should pay all
his debts, whether legitimate or other-
wise, in full, stipulating in his will that
the amount should be deducted from his
son's inheritance. But old Thyssen will
not hear of any such thing. And there
the matter stands.
