THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE ADVANCES IN NOVA SCOTIA

Rev. Mr. Crowell's Address Before Every Day Club—Effective Work of Provincial Alliance

RUSKIN'S BAPTISM John Ruskin was baptized in London by a Presbyterian minister in the Russian Mission at Conston the following certificate is preserved: "Oehlrich Mansie, 14th May, 1891, I hereby certify that John Ruskin, born on the 8th February, 1819, was baptized by me on the 20th February, 1891, at the house of his father, John James Ruskin, Esq., 54 Hunter street, London. (Signed) James Boyd, minister of the parish of Oshillies, in the Presbytery and county of Ayr; at the time referred to in the above certificate, minister of the Calvinistic Church, Cross Street, Hatton Garden, London.

THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE ADVANCES IN NOVA SCOTIA (Continued) The progress of temperance legislation in Nova Scotia was the subject of a portion of a very interesting address by Rev. Mr. Crowell of Halifax at the Every Day Club last night. He pointed out that they have in that province a very effective prohibition law, representing all churches and temperance organizations, and having representatives in every part of the province in Nova Scotia, and he has had a paid secretary, Rev. H. R. Grant, who, in addition to salary, gets enough for expenses to enable him to be constantly on the move, visiting at shortest notice any place in the province where there is work to be done.

THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE ADVANCES IN NOVA SCOTIA (Continued) At its annual meetings this alliance formulates a programme, goes in force to the legislature and asks for additional legislation. As a result of its activity the province outside of Halifax is under the temperance Act or provincial prohibition, and in Halifax on petition of 25 per cent of the electors a prohibition law can and doubtless will be brought on.

THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE ADVANCES IN NOVA SCOTIA (Continued) Little by little the hand of the government has been extended, and Mr. Crowell has no doubt that another forward step will be taken as a result of the coming general election.

THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE ADVANCES IN NOVA SCOTIA (Continued) Mr. Crowell observed that there was too great a tendency to depend on legislation, but legislation was necessary to keep pace with the progress of public sentiment. There was another form of prohibition, however, which should not be overlooked, and that was the individual prohibition by which each person refused to permit liquor to pass his lips.

THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE ADVANCES IN NOVA SCOTIA (Continued) Mr. Crowell quoted high authorities in evidence to prove that alcohol is injurious to health, and it is wrong to say that temperance means a moderate use of liquor. There is no temperance in the use of anything that is harmful. There is safety in total abstinence, and danger in the use of liquor, therefore all men should be total abstainers. It is said that the moderate drinkers become drunkards, but even those who do not reach the latter stage are reduced in their physical, mental and moral efficiency.

THE TEMPERANCE CAUSE ADVANCES IN NOVA SCOTIA (Continued) Speaking to the boys, Mr. Crowell strongly urged them to decide to be total abstainers. He illustrated his address by several instances taken from his own life which had led to terrible consequences. The speaker was heartily thanked for all of anything that he had said, and was very carefully reasoned out.

LYNGHING ON STAGE; FEE CHARGED AT SO MUCH A SHOT Calhoun, Ky., April 21—With militia upon the scene to prevent a race war, the authorities set out today to investigate the lynching of Wm. Potter, a negro, who went to his death last night at Livermore, eight miles from here in a most melodramatic scene of vengeance. Accused of fatally shooting Frank Mitchell, a young white man, the assailant was strung up before the stage of the Livermore Opera House and a crowd of 100 men and boys who filled the theatre riddled his body with bullets. So much a shot was charged, the sum to be turned over to the Mitchell family. Today Potter's body was hanging in shreds. Persons who were willing to pay for orchestra seats were charged double prices.

LAST MINUTE WORDS FROM MANY PLACES Brunswick, Germany, April 21—The dirigible Roonson (arsenal VI), met with a mishap today and was forced to make a rough landing.
