Urges Formation of More Clubs
in Maritime Provinces and Com-

At a special noon-day luncheon yester-
day in Bond's restaurant when partial
returns were made by the committees
at work on the drive for the Oromocto

ernor, and Mr. Grant, president of the

were heard in addresses of interest to
Rotarians and were well received.
Governor Inman referred to the inter-
national convention held in Salt Lake
City this year and said he regretted that

Governor Inman referred to a recent
convention that he and Mr. Grant had
attended in Augusta, Me., at which some
500 Rotarians from New England cen-
tres were present and told of how dele-
gates there had promised to double the
number of clubs in existence in that dis-
trict within the next twelve months.
There was no reason why the maritime
provinces could not do the same, he
thought, before the district conference
next year in Charlottetown. At this



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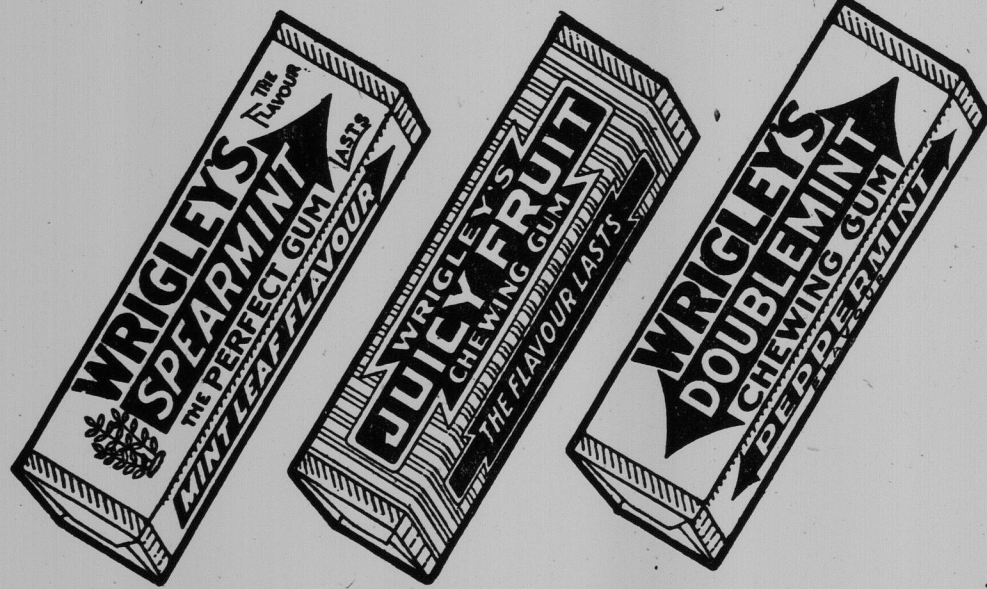
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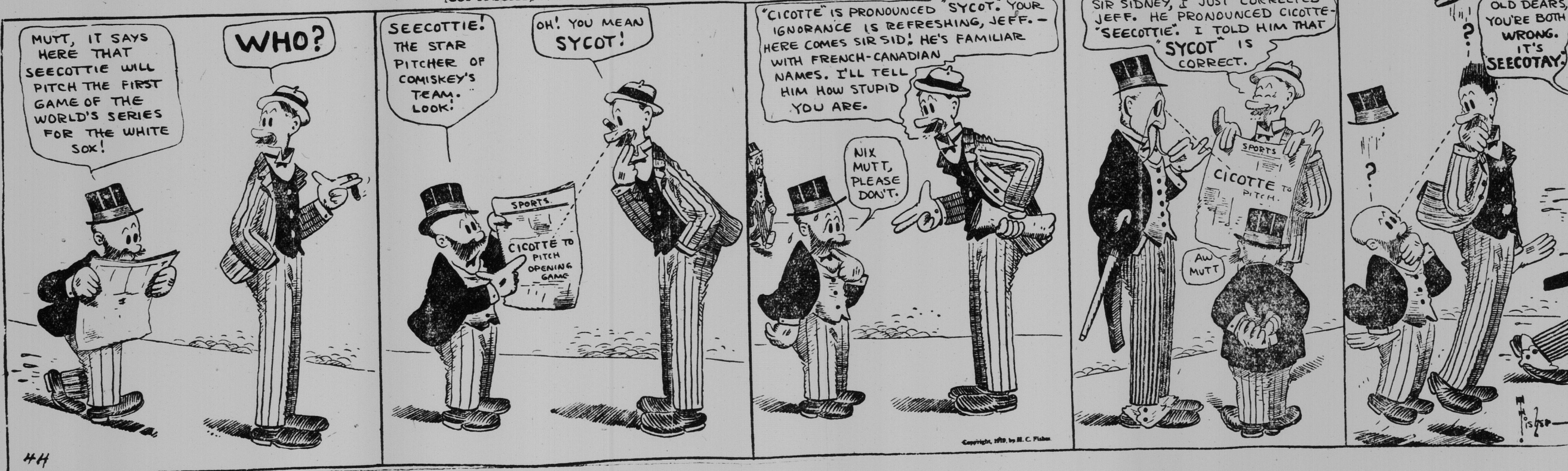
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
