keeper at his hunting lodge in Kemptonville a week ago last Monday night he sprinkled her bed and room with gasoline and then set them afire.

Roberts' story, according to the statements made by the jailor tonight, differs very little from the story as placed together at the inquest. The main facts are that Roberts was infatuated with his housekeeper, that he had proposed marriage to her and had been refused, that on the night of the tragedy, while the two were spending the evening at their neighbor's, the William Randalls, he asked her to go home with him, that she declined and walked home instead with young Ransom Randall.

The old man had preceded the pair to his home and after young Randall had

left the house, went to the girl's room and attempted to assault her. Having failed in his purpose and being told by the girl that she intended telling her father, he left the room, went downstairs and got gasoline. Returning he poured it about the room and then touched a match. The young girl, thinking to escape the flames climbed under the bed, where she was found terribly burned when Roberts returned with the neighbors he had aroused.

DIES FROM BLOW IN FRIENDLY SCUFFLE

Brooklyn Photographer Has Skull Fractured When Fell-
ed by Companion, Who is Held.

New York, Sept. 6.—Jerome Kane, 26 years old, of 5184 East Fourteenth street, Brooklyn, was killed when he was struck in a playful struggle by his friend, Edward Lambert, 27, on the Fifty-ninth street platform of the B. R. T. subway station in Brooklyn.

Kane, who is a photographer, with Lambert, a pressman of The New York Evening Journal, and half a dozen friends had spent the evening at Coney Island. Kane accompanied his friends on their way home and got off the train with them at the Fifty-ninth street station. A friendly scuffle ensued, in which Kane is said to have struck Lambert, Lambert retaliated, and the blow sent Kane to the platform. His skull was fractured. He died before Dr. McInnes of the Norwegian Hospital arrived.

Lambert was held on a charge of homicide. Questioning of members of the party by detectives of the Fourth Avenue station indicated that the blow had been struck in fun. Lambert was arraigned in the Fifth Avenue court before Magistrate Geismar, who held him without bail for the September Grand Jury.

Kane was a veteran of the world war. He lived with his parents. Lambert is married and has two children.

A slight lessening of the demands for nursing service which had been very heavy during the early part of the summer was reported at the meeting of the board of directors of the Victorian Order of nurses held yesterday afternoon

in the Carleton street home with Hon. J. G. Forbes, the president, in the chair. The well baby clinics reports showed that a valuable work was being done in child welfare measures at the clinics. The statistical report presented by Miss D. Coates, the superintendent of the V. O. N., gave the following figures: Total of visits, 1394; nursing visits, 712;

child welfare visits, 622; clinics held, eighteen; babies in attendance, 261; number of babies examined, 190. The number of children receiving milk provided through the fund established by the local council of women was reported to be dropping gradually. There were sixty babies at the present time receiving this free supply of milk.
