

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

London June 12.

The Bank of France returns show decrease of three million of francs.

The latest despatches from Belgrade represent that the excitement prevailing in that city and throughout the Principality, is intense and unabated. No outbreak, however, has occurred in consequence.

Two of the assassins of Prince Michael have been arrested. It has been ascertained that it was not three brothers who fired the fatal shots, but a father and his two sons. One of the latter is still at large but it is believed that he cannot make his escape.

New York, June 12.

Congress has voted to keep the Freedmen's Bureau in operation another year.

Rumors of Cabinet changes are current. Lack of good foundation.

Money market more stringent.

London, June 12.

The directors of the Atlantic 1, reg and Com. have declared a dividend, payable on the first of July, of six per cent. on preference stock and three per cent. on original stock.

At the Act race the Alexandria plate of one thousand sovereigns was won by Mr. Mr. Chaplin's Colt Bluebelly. Her Majesty's plate was won by Mr. Salmon's colt Vale.

Toronto, June 12.

The Globe professes to have information on authority beyond dispute that the Fenian movement upon Canada has actually commenced.

It says that forces are being gradually concentrated at Buffalo and other points.

Forty Fenians went from Fort Huron to Buffalo via Grand Trunk Railroad on Tuesday.

The raid is possible any day after the 20th inst.

The Globe calls on the Government to order the militia to the front and to the rear of the country.

Montreal, June 12.

A seizure of arms at St. Albans yesterday by the United States Government is reported.

Guards from Grand Trunk bridge, well armed, have been stationed at each end of the Victoria bridge.

The 3rd Regiment has been ordered to leave London on the 15th inst. for Quebec.

New York, June 12.

Congress yesterday passed a bill admitting the Southern States lately in rebellion, to representation in Congress.

Queenstown, June 12.

The steamer "Peninsular" from New York has arrived.

New York, June 13.

Despatches from Buffalo say the sensational reports from Canada about a Fenian invasion probably originated with Canadian speculators interested in contracts for supplying the troops.

Hon. Reverdy Johnson, Senator from Maryland, has been confirmed as United States Minister to London.

An Irish resolution has passed Congress requesting the President to interpose with the British Government for the release of Father McMahon, who is in a Canada Jail for implication with the Fenians.

London, June 14.

It is generally understood that the Ministry will make an appeal to the country on the question at issue between them and the House of Commons.

The following is the programme that the Government has decided upon:—

Parliament is to be dissolved in October.

Writs will then be issued for elections which will take place during the month of November and of the 9th of December the meeting of the new Parliament will take place.

It is announced that Ex-Governor Eyre of Jamaica will contest the seat of St. Stuart Mill, member of Parliament from Westminster, London in the coming election.

London, June 15.

In the House of Commons this evening the Secretary of Foreign Affairs, Lord Stanley, said the Egyptian Government entertained a plan for the establishment of Courts of law to protect the rights of residents in Egypt of foreign birth, and the Viceroy was desirous of carrying the measure into effect.

Toronto, June 15.

The volunteers and regulars have been actively preparing for an emergency in consequence of the Fenian rumor.

A brigade will be stationed in each of the cities of Toronto, Hamilton, and London, while other forces will be placed at Collingwood and exposed point, and the reserves organized to take field if necessary.

Complete provision is made for any sudden attempt at a raid.

New York, June 16.

Twenty lives were lost on the Clark 1st, of Boston, from New Orleans bound for Havana, wrecked off Havana.

More Indian Depredations.

St. Louis, June 9.—The Topeka (Kansas) Reporter of Saturday says a despatch from Junction City to Governor Crawford states that the Cheyenne Indians had left the Kaw reservation and on Lyon Creek were driving off cattle and destroying everything as they went. Advice also have been received from Cottonwood Falls. Some five hundred wild Indians on Diamond Creek were driving off stock and committing other depredations. About twenty five families have come into Cottonwood Falls for protection.

St. Louis, June 10.—Upper Missouri advances state that Indian hostilities have again broken out along the river. Steamboats were fired into, stock run off, and several whites have been killed lately. General Terry was at Fort Rice June 3. Father Dismet had gone out to endeavor to induce the Indians to come in and make peace. It is reported that they say they don't want peace, for then they starve; but when it was they get what they want from the whites.

THE INTER-COLONIAL SERVICE.—The Woodstock Acadian says:—

"From Mr. Buck's Survey we have heard by two sources. A few days since he was camped on Grand River. The survey was commenced at the mouth of Three Brooks, on the Grand River, and 29 miles from its mouth. Following that stream about 8 miles, and then the valley of Grand Brook, to the source of the latter; it crossed over the ridge between the Grand and Little Salmon Rivers, into the right hand branch of the latter. The valley of this stream carried it down to the Main Salmon River, which was followed up to the Salmon River, and thence by a brook over to Bryan Brook, on Little River; by it to Little River; up the latter; up Beaver Brook; and thence to Grand River. The distance thus explored is forty one miles. * * * It is satisfactory to know that up to the point now reached the line presents no engineering difficulties. Mr. Buck will continue his survey in a north-western direction, until he connects with Mr. McLennan's party."

The surveying conducted by Mr. Hartley has been discontinued.

From some of our St. John exchanges we learn that the Hon. S. L. Tilley, Minister of Customs, on his visit to that city was "warmly and heartily received by a large concourse of friends" who deemed it unnecessary to get up a demonstration. We learn that Mr. Tilley's visit was shortened, owing to frequent telegrams from Ottawa to attend a full meeting of the Privy Council, at which important matters to the Dominion are to be discussed, and perhaps decided. The nature of the business we are of course unacquainted with; but it is probable that among other important matters, the route of the Intercolonial Railway will engage their attention—provided the British Government have not already decided to order its location by the North Shore or Northern Central line, which we now fear will be the fact, as "the Imperial guarantee and military considerations" will place the power in their hands, to dictate where the road shall be built, but better have none than the North Shore Line. If a UNITED remonstrance is made by the Dominion Government to the Imperial authorities against the adoption of the Northern route, it may possibly have the effect of changing its location. At all events, Mr. Tilley in the Council and Commons, and Mr. Bolton also in the latter house, have faithfully and ably performed their duty to the Province; more could not be expected.

During Mr. Tilley's visit we learn that he was engaged inspecting the Custom House at St. Stephen, St. Andrews and St. John, and that on his return early in July he will visit the remaining Custom House in this and the adjoining Province.

EDUCATIONAL.—We notice in Frederick and St. John papers, commendatory articles on the University, Grammar, Superior, and other School examinations—the proficiency made by the pupils, and the general satisfaction given. But we fail to see the benefit of giving the young men of our Province a thorough University education, if persons are to be imported to fill positions which natives of the country are qualified by education and natural endowments to hold, and perform the duties with zeal and ability, to the satisfaction of the public who are in point of fact, the most deeply interested and taxed to support our educational institutions.

Mr. Tilley proceeded to Ottawa on Monday last, and we understand will return to this Province the first week in July, and remain for some weeks.

We are pleased to learn that Mr. White's School is filling up rapidly; already there is more than double the number of scholars required by law, and it is probable that the average attendance of scholars will necessitate his applying for an assistant after the holidays. We learn that Mr. White has consented to instruct a class of young ladies in French and German, as soon as the requisite number is made up.

We are informed that the Collector of Customs at this Port, has received instructions to grant Fishery Season Licenses for 1868, which may be issued to Foreign Fishing Vessels admitting them to the inshore fisheries of Canada, on payment of licence fees, rateable according to tonnage of each vessel at \$2 per ton.

A published Return of Dominion Election Expenses, printed by order of the House of Commons, has been received from Ottawa, in which, to our surprise, we notice that the accounts have been paid for every County in the Dominion but Charlotte County! The cause stated in the blue book is as follows:— "Charlotte County.—The account of the Election Expenses for this County have not been sent in." Surely this must be a mistake. This we know however, that the expenses have not been paid, and that some persons interested, are taking measures to know the reason why.

Active Temperance Movement.

Boston.—The State Temperance Committee appointed at the recent Convention have issued an address, urging the friends of temperance to commence preparations for the contest without delay, by forming prohibitory clubs all over the State. It is also urged as a preliminary work that a meeting be held in every city and town to vote on the question of licensing the sale of liquor to be drunk on the premises. The Committee say they do not ask the friends of prohibition to form a new political party, but to place the Republican party at its next State Convention on that platform, which commands itself to the conscience and judgment of a majority of its members.

The Fredericton Railway Company are likely to have some difficulty in the settlement of damages. In one case \$52 were awarded where \$1,000 were claimed. Application has been made to the Supreme Court by H. B. Rainsford, Esq., on behalf of E. Simonds, Esq., Col. Stewart, M. H. Peters, W. B. Jack and R. Dunn, Esquires, to set aside the awards of the appraisers.

The "St. Croix Courier" says: A two top-masted schooner of about 175 tons called the "More Light" was launched from the shipyard of O. B. Richert, Esq., Calais, on Friday night last. She was built for Messrs. G. D. King & Sons and no pains have been spared to make her one of the most creditable vessels out of the many of that class constructed in the same yard. It is also necessary to look at her deck, from hooks, bilge ways and clamps with their material, fastenings and workmanship to form a correct idea of her strength and safety, while her well finished cabin with its officer's staterooms, steward's pantry, etc. are a decided improvement on the uncomfortable quarters usually found "aft" in vessels of this size.

Our friend Capt. B. Bradford is to command this vessel. Capt. B. has sailed vessels from this Port for many years, and is known to be "a smart seaman."

Brownsville, Texas, June 6.—Santa Anna's filibusters will strike Bagdad by the 11th instant. They are fully prepared to take the place, and wish to act before the return of General McCook at Corpus Christi. There is an intense excitement in Brownsville and Matamoros. Some of the Americans are joining Santa Anna's movement.

The utmost corruption, fraud and disorder in the Brownsville Custom House has been inaugurated by Whaley, the new Collector. Whaley is kept in a constant state of intoxication by the smuggling ring.

Though we hear many complaints of the hardness of the times, our traders appear to be quite busy; certain it is the Farmers cannot complain of the prices which have ruled for produce during the past two months, though, no doubt, many of them regret that they have not had large stocks of potatoes, grain and butter. The mills at the mouth of the creek are driving away, night and day, unceasingly as if it was necessary that all the logs with which the stream is jammed completely full for miles should be saved within a very short time. We observe that Mr. Leary has raised a bell upon his mill, the clang of which makes a nice variety in the waters, the whirling circles and the tearing upright ganges. Our Machines are not idle. At the door and ash factory Messrs. Fraser & Deibel are kept constantly on the drive with work, the same applies to Messrs. Small & Filders' foundry, and to the mills of Messrs. Dibley, Davis and Haylen. Several buildings under way give employment to the carpenters. The work of finishing the interior of the Wesleyan church is being pro-

ceeded with. Dr. Smith has the frame of a large dwelling house up and enclosed, on the site of his former residence, and a large block of wooden buildings is up on the site of the McGlynn and Phillips property on Water street.—(Carl. Sentinel.)

Mr. Schreiber, manager in Mr. Fleming's absence of the surveying parties, was in town on Tuesday. As we surmised last week none of the parties out surveying have been withdrawn except Mr. Hartley's, and on his section work has been suspended simply because all difficulties had been surmounted and there existed no necessity for further work, at present. We understand that Mr. Buck is succeeding on his section very satisfactorily.—[Ibid.]

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR

GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

ON the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and under the authority of the 19th section of "The Fisheries Act."

His Excellency in Council has been pleased to make the following Regulations:—

Herrings shall not be taken between the Fifteenth day of July and the Fifteenth day of October in any year, on the spawning ground, at the southern head of Grand Manan, in the Province of New Brunswick, within the following limits, that is to say:—Commencing at the eastern part of Seal Cove, including the two Inner Islands (so called) at a place known as Red Point, thence extending westerly along the coast to the southern head of Bradford's Cove, and extending one mile from the shore; and all nets or other fishing material, apparatus, tackle or gear used for catching Herrings on any part of the said ground during the period above described, shall be seized and confiscated; and every person so using the same shall be subject to fine or imprisonment.

Oysters shall not be fished for, caught or killed between the First day of June and the First day of September in any year.
