

REPORTS OF COLLEGE WORK AND RESOLUTIONS THEREUPON.

VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

In the absence of the Rev. Chancellor Burwash, S.T.D., the Revs. Professors Reynar, LL.D., and F. H. Wallace, M.A., addressed the Conference in the interest of Victoria University, and reported the work done during the past year. Whereupon it was moved by Rev. T. M. Campbell, and seconded by Rev. E. Roberts, and

Resolved,—That we have heard with satisfaction the addresses of Rev. Dr. Reynar and Professor Wallace in reporting the work of Victoria University for the past year. We beg to assure Chancellor Burwash and the other members of the Faculty of our unabated interest in the work of the College and continued sympathy with them in their very responsible labors.

ALBERT COLLEGE. †

The Rev. Principal Dyer, M.A., presented a most encouraging report of the work of Albert College during the year. Over 200 students have been enrolled, giving an increase of twenty per cent. in the attendance, being the largest in the history of the College. Thirty-one were preparing for junior and nine for senior matriculation. No other college in Canada was preparing so large a class of matriculants. Twenty-nine wrote in the Conference Examinations. Almost every Conference and Province was represented, from Montreal to British Columbia. The College has a Commercial department, a class in Elocution, a Music and Fine Art department, also Young Men's Christian Association and Young Women's Christian Association, and Missionary Societies. The report was favorably received by the Conference, whereupon, it was moved by Rev. J. J. Rice, seconded by Rev. Prof. Wallace, and

Resolved,—That the Annual statement of Albert College, by Principal Dyer has been listened to with deep interest, and the great importance of that institution in relation to higher education, subject to religious influence and supervision, is fully recognized. We hereby place on record our high appreciation of the valuable work being done by Principal Dyer and his efficient staff, and we are still prepared to afford all legitimate encouragement and aid to the institution under their management and control.

ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE.

The Rev. Principal Austin, M.A., B.D., presented the report, and stated there had been 181 students who were enrolled as to departments as follows:—Preparatory, 28; Academic, 33; Collegiate, 47; the Music School has enrolled for Piano Course, 120; for Voice Training, 31; for Harmony, 25; in the Fine Art School there were 50 pupils; in School of Elocution, 31; and in the Commercial School, 25.

The College is affiliated to the Victoria University, giving the students University standing. The Music School was never more efficient, and the Fine Art School is affiliated with the Educational Department of Ontario, the students having received 500 departmental certificates and
