BRIEF DESPATCHES.

ROME, Dec. 18.—The general strike of seamen is causing considerable anxiety. At Genoa, 25,000 emigrants are prevented from leaving for their destinations because of the trouble. The International Federation of Workers on sea and land transportation at Hamburg, has promised to support the strike.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 18.—H. H. Ten Eyck, formerly coach of the Philadelphia Berge Club, was appointed coach of the University of Wisconsin's crews today to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Andrew M. O'Dea.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Conferees were held today between the political leaders of both houses of parliament in an endeavor to reach an agreement on the education bill, but were without result. They will be resumed tomorrow. In consequence of the conference, the debate on the measure in the house of lords was postponed.

ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 18.—Emperor Nicholas has approved the bill of the council of ministers removing the disabilities of Jews. By the bill Jews are permitted to live in the country as well as in the cities within the pale and certain restrictions placed on Jewish merchants and artisans in cities outside the pale are removed.

ROCKVILLE, Conn., Dec. 18.—The state resided in case late today in the trial of Charles Henry Bishop, the 18-year-old farm hand, charged with

the murder of Mrs. Henry Williams, of Tolland, who had taken him from the country home. Five days have been consumed by the state in the presentation of its evidence. The defense was not ready to go on with the case and adjournment was taken until tomorrow morning.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 18.—Atlantic Coast Line passenger train No. 42, north bound, here from Tampa, collided head-on with a south bound extra freight near McGuire's Creek, seven miles from Jacksonville, today, killing Claude Bailey, white, express helper, and seriously injuring W. F. Shelley, engineer, of the passenger train; H. C. Calder, express messenger; Baggage Master Wooten. Calder may die. The express, mail and baggage cars of the passenger train were telescoped. Several passengers were slightly hurt.

LEWISTON, Me., Dec. 18.—It was announced in Lewiston tonight that an advance of five per cent. in wages would be granted in the Lewiston mills to take effect Dec. 31.—This is the second advance in wages given by the Lewiston mills during the past six months, as last August the wages were voluntarily increased. All of the mills are running full time and have a large amount of raw material on hand.

WHEELING, W. Va., Dec. 18.—One man was killed, three fatally injured and a number of others slightly hurt tonight when a motor car in the Bell-stee steel works mine of the Carnegie Steel Co., ran off the track, knocking down several of the mine supports and causing a cave-in.

The dead: William Wright, Belleaire, Ohio, a brakeman.

The fatally injured: Joseph Penneman, motorman; Harry Schuckman, and John Bainbridge, all of Belleaire, Ohio.

BOSTON, Dec. 18.—The first request for a reduction of telephone rates filed with the Massachusetts Highway Commission under the recent law placing telephone and telegraph companies under this commission, was made today by persons representing a number of citizen organizations of this city.

The highway commission will advise a hearing on the petition and will investigate the operating expenses of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company.

LAWRENCE, Mass., Dec. 18.—Edward Littlefield of Wells Beach, Me., who was injured in a rear-end collision between a passenger train and a Manchester bound freight on the western division of Boston and Maine railroad last night at the North Station in this city, died at the Lawrence General Hospital at 8.30 tonight from the effects of his injuries. The body will be forwarded to the home of the deceased at Wells Beach, Me., today. He is survived by a number of brothers.

PENSACOLA, Fla., Dec. 18.—Fort Barrancos soldiers are charged with firing on a train. Army officers are investigating.

SURVEY OF WORLD IS YET INCOMPLETE

Heroic Devotion of Native Members of Indian Survey Alone Makes Work Possible.

Of the total land area of the earth less than one-sixth has been as yet accurately surveyed; and on this small fraction of the globe Europe accounts for the greater part. Nearly 4,000,000 square miles of the British Empire are still unmapped, in addition to such immense areas as Canada, Australia and India; but, according to the last report of the Indian Survey Committee the completion of the one-inch topographical map of all India only awaits a survey of the Rajputana Desert. The Indian Survey has also accomplished no less than 55,000 square miles in Tibet and 6,000 in South Arabia. In South Africa the Rhodesian survey is being actively carried on, only three stations now remaining south of the Zambezi not fully connected with the main triangulation.

Much of the work of the Indian Survey, says the Westminster Gazette, has only been made possible by the unselfish devotion of native members of the staff, a typical instance of which is that of Sheikh Mohandun, who died of malarial fever in the Persian desert, his native assistant—who on his officers' death had taken the plane sheets from the board and wound them around his body, being found insensible in a distant pool of water. For the past five years eleven French officers and 25 soldiers of the Service Geographique de l'Armee have been engaged in measuring the great area of Peru, and many of them succumbed to the terrible privations to which they were exposed in the wilds of the Cordillera. From Africa, where British survey officers are slowly creeping northward from Rhodesia and southward from Egypt, come similar records of hardships endured, and, indeed, wherever the theodolite is following the explorer,

EVIL EFFECT OF

CARNEGIE'S GIFT

Donations to Scotch Universities Not a Blessing

Students Receive Fees From Funds and Squander Money Supplied by Parents

—Professors Raise Prices.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Prof. Sir William Japp, Sinclair, of Victoria University, Manchester, in a speech at Aberdeen, voiced the numerous severe complaints of the evil effect of Andrew Carnegie's gift of \$2,000,000 to the Scottish universities. He said that he had never met an Aberdeen graduate who did not denounce the influence of the gift.

It is learned from other sources that most students at all the Scottish universities had drawn fees from the trust fund, many of them squandering the money supplied by their parents, and concealing the fact that they received help from the fund. It is also asserted that the university professors, in view of the students receiving these donations, have raised their tutorial fees and become less earnest in performing their duties. It is declared that the Scottish student is losing his self-reliance and capacity for study under difficulties, and that the whole nature of Scottish university training is undergoing a change for the worse.

CITY LABORERS HEAR WORDS OF WISDOM

The members of the City Laborers' Union held a smoker in their rooms in Berryman's Building last night. There were a number of speeches made, and the gathering, which was a large one, passed a very pleasant evening. W. F. Hatheway was present and addressed the union, dwelling at considerable length on the old age pension scheme which is in operation in New Zealand and which is being agitated for in England. In addressing the meeting Douglas McArthur spoke of the new assessment act and censured that part of it which would result in the disfranchisement of a number of electors. Speeches were also made by Alderman Sproule, Thos. Kichman, Peter Sharkey, Secretary E. M. Burke and President Jas. Sullivan. Music from a gramophone supplied the balance of the programme.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 3 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situate.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans: (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of the homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
