Lugubrious Correspondent Intimates That Lord Roberts is in for a Long Fight.

Bloemfontein Correspondents Say That the Movement of Troops Continue With Bewildering Frequency.

Part of the Eighth Division Has Arrived at Cape Town-Boers Reported in Considerable Strength at the Southeastern Part of the Free State.

WAR SUMMARY. LONDON, April 10 .- Part of the eighth division, which had just arrived out from England, landed at Cape Town Sunday. The remainder were sent to Port Elizabeth, but these troops have been recalled to Cape Town, and will land there. Mean while the commander of the division, Gen. Sir Henry Rundle, has been sent to Kimberley on special duty. This is assumed to indicate that he will cooperate with Gen. Methuen instead of joining Gen. Roberts. The holding back of despatches filed by the correspondents further indidates that movements are going on that the censor will not allow to be reported. The Boers are again re-ported to be present in considerable strength in the south-eastern part of the Orange Free State, and they are also frequently feeling their way west of the railway. Their intentions have not yet been discovered, but they are under close observation. The British observation extends to Truter's Drift, 25 miles from Bioemfontein towards Boshof. Gen. Cronje's laager hat Raardeberg has been re-occupied by the Boers, who are probably in search of buried arms and ammunition. A Cape Town despatch to the Daily

News, dated Sunday, declares that the Reddersburg disaster is considerably discounted, as the Boer commando which captured the British cannot get away from the other British forces under Gen. Gatacre, who are in close pursuit of them. The News' military critic remarks that it is probable that the correspondent has been misled by cid information, and another telegram asserts that Gen. Gatacre has retired to Bethulie after missing the Reddersburg victors.


