The cholera continues to make fearful progress in Russia and Turkey. By the late accounts received of the progress of the cholera, in Moldavia, the visitation was excessively severe. At Jassy, from the 17th to the 25th, 1739 persons had been attacked, of whom 810 died, and 635 remained in the hospital. A dreadful earnings recently took place at Nensatz, between the Hungarians, consisting of troops of the line and militia, and the Rakpa insurgents. The latter lost 250 men, and the former 19.
