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WORK IS FOUND THE SOURCES OF RUBBER

London, May 28.—According to the monthly report of the work of the labor exchanges for April, the number of exchanges has increased since the last report from 93 to 98, including a Soho office, which has been opened for the registration of women and girls seeking employment in the dress-making and millinery trades in the West-end of London. The following tabular statement of the doings of the labor exchanges from Feb. 2 to April 30 point to their increasing usefulness.

WORK IS FOUND THE SOURCES OF RUBBER FOR 11,000

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ANOTHER STEEL BOND PACIFIC WITH THE ATLANTIC

A MOUNTAIN STATION ON THE NEW ANDEAN RAILROAD. THE METHOD OF CROSSING THE MOUNTAINS BETWEEN ARGENTINE REPUBLIC AND CHILE.

A cable from Valparaiso, Chile, tells of the running of the first passenger train from Buenos Ayres to Valparaiso through a tunnel that pierced the very heart of the Andes mountains. This marks another transcontinental railroad linking the Atlantic and Pacific, and the first in South America.

PORTAGE. Portage, Kings county, May 28.—The mill which will saw Mr. J. D. Laing's lumber has arrived and is now about in place.

Probably very few of those who have gone on rubber shares know that the number of plants producing rubber is considerable and that they differ very materially in their relative value in the production of rubber for commercial purposes.

Ranking next in importance is the well-known Ficus elastica, which belongs to the natural order Urticaceae and produces the Assam rubber.

Paraffin is obtained from several species of Hevia, but by far the most important of these is Hevia brasiliensis. This species is widely distributed in South America and with other members of the genus is strongly represented in regions drained by the mighty Amazon and its tributaries.

Rather more than thirty years ago for cultivation in India was recognized and introduced to the East Indies by the introduction of the tree into Ceylon and other parts of our eastern possessions in sufficient numbers to carry out experiments on a large scale.

The difficulties were considerable, but they were eventually surmounted and there are now large areas of rubber trees that are giving an ample return. Under favorable conditions the trees grow with great rapidity, and it is recorded that rubber trees planted at the Henaratoda Garden, Ceylon, have attained a height of fifty feet and a girth of two feet in six years.

Ficus elastica, the "India rubber plant" of gardens and the source of Assam rubber, is of course well known in our growing in its native habitat and under cultivation where it has sufficient space for its full development it presents a very different appearance from the largest of the specimens that may be met with under glass in this country.

It indeed spreads so freely in cultivated plantations in Burma and elsewhere that eighteen plants to the acre are considered quite sufficient. It is found growing wild in moist forests from the base of the Sikkim Himalaya eastward to Assam and Arakan, and in upper Burma it is so plentiful as to form large forests.
