**MRS. BELLE BRAMAN**  
**BRANK CARBOLIC ACID,**  
**IS NOW IN HOSPITAL**

**Young Woman Supposed to Have Become Despondent—Her Father in 55th.**

The condition of Mrs. Belle Braman, who attempted to end her life yesterday morning by drinking carbolic acid, was reported unchanged at the General Public Hospital this morning.

Mrs. Braman, who resided with her mother, Mrs. Thomas Andrews, Erin street, left the breakfast table yesterday and was discovered by her mother a few minutes later in a fainting condition in the front room with an empty bottle, labelled "carbolic," in her hand.

Mrs. Andrews summoned help, an antidote of milk was administered which, probably, prolonged the woman's life.

The ambulance was sent for and she was taken to the General Public Hospital.

Mrs. Braman is the step-mother of John Braman, convicted of shooting Policeman O'Leary about a year ago, and it is thought that her experiences at the trial preyed on her mind and made her despondent.

The young woman's father is a member of the 55th Battalion, and she has also two brothers, wearing khaki—one in the West Indies and one in England after being wounded in France.

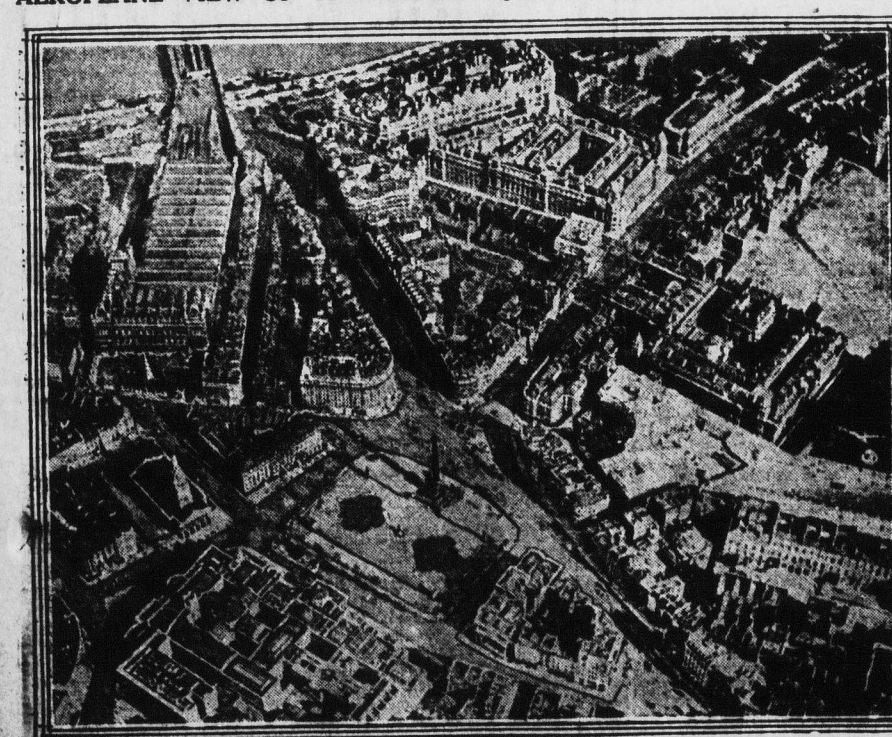

## WILL REINVEST PART OF FUNDS

**Methodist Ministers' Sup-  
ernumerary Fund Com-  
mittee in session here  
yesterday.**

The Supernumerary Fund Committee of the Methodist Church met in a class room of Centenary church on Thursday morning. The members of the committee present were the general treasurer, Rev. A. D. Morton, D. D., and Joseph A. Likely, Esq., and Rev. W. H. Langille and Judge S. A. Chesley or the N. S. Conference and Rev. G. F. Dawson and Prof. G. W. Hutton of the N. B. and P. E. I. Conference.

Judge Chesley was elected chairman and Rev. W. H. Langille secretary.

The committee having charge of the investment of the capital of the fund, amounting to about \$158,000.00, is Messrs. J. A. Likely, R. T. Hayes, J. Willard Smith and Rev. Dr. Morton.

The committee carefully scrutinized all the investments consisting of mortgages, stocks, bonds and notes, and instructed the treasurer to call in the amounts not drawing satisfactory interest and to invest them more profitably.

P. F. Blanchet, C. A., is auditor of the fund.

The annual income for distribution among 130 claimants is received from interest on the capital, contributions from the circuits and payments by the ministers (3 p.c. of their salaries of the preceding year).

The claimants of the fund are ministers who through ill health or old age are incapacitated for circuit work and they are supposed to receive an annuity equal to the sum of ten dollars for each year they are in the active work of the ministry. The committee regrets to report that the fund was able to pay only 80 p.c. of these claims for the past year.

An increase of the endowment is imperatively needed. Through the energetic efforts of Rev. George Steel, who acted as agent of the fund, more than \$18,000 was added to the endowment, and it is earnestly hoped that as soon as possible the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Conferences will raise the amount of endowment allotted to them. There is a splendid opening here for the investment of amounts by charitably disposed men of wealth.

## THE RECRUITING WORK TO BE CONTINUED WITH GREATER ENERGY

**Executive in session last evening decide on new blood for the Committee.**

The daily meeting of the recruiting committee was held last evening instead of in the afternoon as had previously been the custom. This made possible a more lengthy session than was convenient under the old arrangement. Certainly the session was lengthy if nothing else. The main question up for discussion was the action to be taken following the developments at the citizens' meeting on Wednesday afternoon at which the recruiting committee continue its good work. It was felt by some of the more active members that during the past couple of weeks they had devoted to the recruiting campaign more time and energy than they could well spare from their business affairs, and if the work were to continue others who at the general meeting had signified their willingness to assist should be given opportunity to do so.

After a lengthy discussion it was, on resolution, decided that the executive committee be empowered to continue or change the present sub-committees be left with the chairman, the old officers to continue until the new take office. Col. Sturdee will appoint the executive.

A financial report, preliminary in its nature, was presented by the treasurer, George E. Barbour, showing that there had been expended to date something in the vicinity of \$100,000.00, and that the Provincial Government would be responsible for about one hundred and twenty. 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## YOU MAY ASSIST THE SOLDIERS

**Queen Mary Petticoat will be Used to Raise Funds—Tickets to be Sold**

Her Majesty Queen Mary of England who has always been admired by right thinking people for her good head sense, has measured up fully to her reputation, and has set a noble example to the women of the Empire in this the greatest of all wars.

By her unflinching efforts and sympathy she ranks second only to Queen Elizabeth of Belgium. With her own hands Queen Mary has crocheted a number of petticoats which have been sent out to the Canadian Branch of Queen Mary's Needlework Guild.

It has been decided to send one petticoat to each province of the Dominion in the hope that each petticoat will bring five hundred dollars with which to buy materials to make garments for the soldiers in the hospitals. The materials so bought are to be distributed among the out-of-way places of the Dominion where women feel that they cannot give both the time and material. It will thus be seen that the money will be spent in Canada for materials and the garments made therefrom will be sent direct to Queen Mary who distributes them herself in the various hospitals.

Mrs. Wood, wife of Lieutenant Governor Wood has consented to direct this work in New Brunswick, that the women of Canada may stand a chance of owning a garment made by Her Majesty, Queen Mary, of England. It is probable that tickets will be sold at 25 cents each. This is not a large sum, and without doubt many women in New Brunswick will possess themselves of a number of tickets in the hope of being a proud possessor of such a garment.

Mrs. Wood has asked Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, regent of the Royal Standard Chapter I. O. D. E., to dispose of the tickets in St. John and Charlotte counties and any lady who desires to show her appreciation of the gift of Her Gracious Majesty, may obtain tickets from Mrs. Smith or any member of this particular chapter.

As the number of tickets are limited, each lady desirous of being a possible possessor of the coveted garment crocheted by royal fingers, had better apply at once as returns are to be made in a short time.

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
