

## FOUND GUILTY OF SEDITION

Man, who claims P.E.I. as birthplace faces Serious charge in Calgary.

Calgary, June 9.—Arthur Trauer, an employee of the provincial government at Strathmore, Alberta, was found guilty of sedition by Justice Simmons this afternoon. Sentence was reserved. Trauer laughed when he heard that the Lusitania was sunk by the Germans, and gloated over the horrors. The citizens of Strathmore wanted to tar and feather him, but were discouraged from this action. Trauer was born in Prince Edward Island, and claims that he is a British subject.

Leaves today to sail for England where he will take up duties with Imperial Army Medical Corps.

Special to The Standard. Hartland, N. B., June 9.—Dr. L. D. Macfarlane on Monday received a telegram from Halifax notifying him of his appointment as surgeon with the overseas forces, and ordering him to leave here on Thursday for Montreal, from whence he will sail to report for duty at the War Office in England for service as surgeon in the Imperial Army Medical Corps. He leaves at noon on Thursday.

The term of service for which he has been engaged is one year. During his absence his practice will be looked after by Dr. C. A. Chapin of Montreal, a graduate of McGill, who arrived today.  
Dr. Macfarlane has been in practice here for ten years and has been very successful. Besides his profession, the doctor has been a live wire in some important industries of the place and his removal for the time being will be keenly felt by the general public.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Office or Sub-Agent for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agent) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land. A homestead of 160 acres may be homesteaded on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead least as long as the homesteader remains on the land. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$100.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
