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COMPLETE THE JURY AND BEGIN EVIDENCE IN THE ARSON CASE

John L. Coughlan and Other Witnesses Testify at Yesterday's Session.

Mr. Coughlan Not Sure Shoes Were the Same—An Error in Measurements Shown

After two days' sessions the preliminary objections and challenges in the arson case of the King vs. Joseph O'Brien and John Hughes were finally disposed of yesterday morning, the remaining five jurors being sworn in. The case was continued throughout the day and considerable progress was made in the presentation for the crown.

The most important witness was John L. Coughlan. The crown is relying quite heavily on Mr. Coughlan's evidence relative to the measurement of the shoe of the mare "Kitty" which the accused are alleged to have driven to the scene of the fire. Mr. Coughlan was cross-examined for upwards of an hour by Mr. Mullin, K. C., chief counsel for the defence, and the witness swore he was not sure that the shoe prints, which he had seen near Crawford's, were the same as those he had noticed at Laydon's. He also admitted that he had made a mistake in the measurement of a shoe produced in court.

On his re-examination by Attorney General Byrne for the crown, the witness stated he was sure he had measured the shoe of the mare "Kitty" correctly. He did not make a note of the measurements but, as was usual for him in such cases, carried the figures in his memory.

Prior to cross-examination Mr. Mullin asked the witness what he meant by the remark: "Is that loud enough for you?" when he had been asked to speak louder in giving his testimony. Mr. Mullin said this remark had hurt him (Mr. Mullin) and that he was rather surprised that Mr. Coughlan should have made it. Mr. Coughlan replied that the remark was made to Mr. Mullin, but that it was intended for the Attorney-General, and that he (Mr. Coughlan) meant only what was proper, desiring to know if he was speaking sufficiently loud to be heard.

In his direct-examination by the Attorney-General the witness said he knew considerable about horses and the imprint made by the shoe was especially peculiar and rare.

To Mr. Mullin he said he did not post as an expert. The imprints, he thought, might have been made several days before.

William J. Crawford told of the loss of his cottage and the value of the property.

David McCroskey and William T. Gibson told of the defendant John Hughes, endeavoring to hire a horse and rig from them. Their evidence was practically the same as that given to the court and jury at the first trial.

Arthur Heston, an assistant at Donnelly's stable, told of hiring the mare "Kitty" with a rubber tired rig to the defendants. All the rigs in the stable were rubber tired. The mare had been out regularly both before and after the fire. No change had been made in her shoes.

The case will be resumed this morning at 10 o'clock.

SAFETY COMMISSIONER PRESENTS HIS REASONS

For Not Allowing Use of Fire Horses in Watering Streets—No Action Taken by Council.

Commissioner McLellan presented his side of the case re the use of fire horses for watering the streets at yesterday's meeting of the council in committee, but no action was taken as Commissioner Fisher said he had not intended to bring the matter up and had not prepared any resolution.

Mayor Hayes presided and all the commissioners were present when council opened.

Commissioner McLellan presented a plan of the city streets with the portions in which the fire horses could be used marked in red, and demonstrated that this area was small in comparison to the total area to be watered. He was opposed to the principle of taking the fire horses away from the engine houses for other purposes as they should be immediately available when a fire occurred.

He then asked if the council intended to take any action, and was told by Commissioner Fisher that he had not prepared any resolution, not having intended to bring the subject up at the meeting.

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ST. JOHN MAN WILL BE DIRECTOR AT CAMP IN UNITED STATES

H. O. Bonk, of Y. M. C. A., Leaves for Spartanburg, N. C., to Work at Soldiers' Concentration Field.

Mr. H. O. Bonk, who has been connected with the Y.M.C.A. for the past three years as physical director, left yesterday for the United States where he will take up his work as director of physical activities in the Wadsworth Training Camp, Spartanburg, N. C. While attending the boys camp at Chippewa, Mr. Bonk received his appointment to this position, which will consist of looking after the physical welfare of the soldiers at the camp, superintending their sports and games and arranging social programmes for their leisure time in the evenings. He will be located at the camp for at least three months and will follow the troops when they move to new quarters. Before going to the scene of his new labors Mr. Bonk will stop off for a week at Massillon, Ohio, visiting his old home.

Mr. Bonk while in his capacity of physical director, built up his department to a high state of perfection and instituted many new innovations which greatly increased the efficiency of the department. During his term of office he has added greatly to the membership of his department and in other ways he has worked hard in making the physical department of the Y.M.C.A. the greatest influence for good in the community that it is today.
