

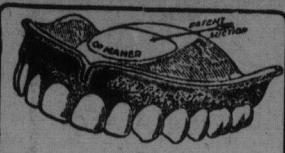

Active Service Units Reduced

Depot Battalion Bandmen Receive Discharge Tomorrow After Performing Grand Service — Other Branches Also Receiving Attention.

The depot battalion band, which went overseas with the 11th Battalion and men when they marched away to war, which has cheered the hearts of those who had to stay at home during the black days when the war clouds were heaviest, and which was first to welcome the returning heroes, will soon be an institution of the past.

Yesterday the process of reducing the strength of the active service units was conducted by a special military board. What is known as the seventh garrison regiment, which is composed of members of the depot battalion and the third and ninth siege batteries, will be considerably reduced, at least one-half of the men being given their discharge from the army.

The transport sections, the military police corps and other branches of the service are likewise receiving considerable reductions, and it is expected that by Saturday the military strength at the seventh garrison will not be much more than one-third of what it was a week ago.

Under this arrangement the garrison band will be disbanded tomorrow. This splendid organization of musicians, which is known as one of the finest military bands in Canada, has had quite an interesting experience. This band, which had its nucleus in the old 62nd Battalion, was brought into the line as the musical organization of the 11th Battalion, later the 236th Klitties and more recently with the N. B. depot battalion. It has made one trip across the ocean, and conducted the Klitties from Montreal to Halifax. Its work in connection with the military life of the province was invaluable and it is a conservative assertion to state that its demobilization will be a distinct loss to musical circles and the public generally.

COMMON COUNCIL MET YESTERDAY

Decided to Proceed With Development of Playground Area at Gilbert's Lane—Kennedy Street Residents Ask for Lights, Water and Sewerage.

At the meeting of the Common Council held yesterday morning it was decided to proceed with the development of the playground area at the corner of Gilbert's Lane and Rockwood Park, on the understanding that, when the necessary legislation had been obtained, the city would be able to take possession of the premises and give judgment accordingly. His Honor Judge Armstrong gave judgment for the defendant in the suit of Mrs. Edith E. Keown vs. John A. Selfridge. The plaintiff wished to dispossess Selfridge, who is a tenant of hers at 16 Sydney street. After hearing the evidence, His Honor found that Selfridge was rightly in possession of the premises and gave judgment accordingly. W. M. Ryan appeared for Mr. Selfridge and H. F. Puddington and J. Roy Campbell, K. C., for Mrs. Keown.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL TO HELP LANCASTER PROVIDE GOOD ROADS

Will Advance \$10,000 to be Spent on Permanent Highways—Empower Buildings Committee to Secure Full Information Regarding Cost of New Court House and Repairing Old Building.

The municipal council yesterday approved of the town planning scheme as prepared by the Town Planning Commission, and appointed a committee to act with the commission in putting it into operation; passed a resolution to loan the parish of Lancaster the sum of \$10,000 for highway purposes, empowered the buildings committee to secure full information as to the cost of repairing the present court house and the erection of a new building; agreed to the resignation of Dr. James Christie as a member of the Board of Commissioners of the General Public Hospital; and on motion of Councillor Bullock the draft was approved and Warden Golding and Councillors O'Brien and Shillingford appointed a committee to assist in carrying out the plans.

Mr. Bullock then moved on the table a copy of the proposed act governing town planning, and asked that the council approve of it. Mr. Estabrook also asked for the approval of the plans. On motion of Councillor Bullock the draft was approved and Warden Golding and Councillors O'Brien and Shillingford appointed a committee to assist in carrying out the plans.

The finance committee recommended that bonds to the amount of \$30,000, for the power house and laundry at the General Public Hospital, be issued; that a chartered accountant be engaged to enquire into and report on the system of accounting used by the municipality and the boards of commissions connected with it, and depending on it for financial assistance, and recommend any changes which might tend toward the betterment of the system, accounts to be engaged by the warden and chairman of the finance committee; that bills amounting to \$429.99 be paid. Some objection to the adoption of the section relating to the auditing of the accounts was raised and Councillor Hayes explained that this was only for the purpose of unifying the accounts, and no reflection was intended to be cast on either the wardens of the municipality or the boards. With this explanation the report passed.

The report of the buildings committee was presented by Councillor Thornton as follows:

The County Court House having been partly destroyed by fire on the morning of the 12th day of February, 1919, your committee on county buildings, on the 21st day of February, 1919, and an invited the chairman of the county buildings committee with the county secretary to secure suitable quarters for the Law Courts.

Your sub-committee having found rooms for the Law Courts, the building of the Masonic Grand Lodge Corporation, have leased same for one year, from 1st day of May, 1919, at the annual rental of \$1,000, and the following persons were examined under oath: George E. Blake, chief of the fire department of the City of St. John; Charles McCleary, chemical engineer; and H. Saunders, City of St. John; Charles McCleary.

The Warden and County Secretary have executed a lease which is hereto annexed, and your committee request your confirmation of same.

Your committee have provided a room for the Sheriff in the quarters rented from the Masonic Corporation, to hold an inquiry upon oath under the provisions of the Municipalities Act, held an investigation under oath in the office of the County Secretary on the 21st day of February, 1919, and the following persons were examined under oath: George E. Blake, chief of the fire department of the City of St. John; Charles McCleary, chemical engineer; and H. Saunders, City of St. John; Charles McCleary.

Councillor Hayes moved that steps be taken to expropriate lots 13 and 15 on White street, the same being needed by the commissioners of the General Public Hospital, and that Gilbert G. Murdoch be appointed the city agent to make the necessary surveys and measurements. Adopted.

The resignation of Dr. James Christie as a member of the commissioners of the General Public Hospital was read and accepted.

Councillor O'Brien moved that the county secretary be instructed to write to Dr. Christie, expressing the appreciation of the Municipality for services rendered and regret at the departure of a pleasant and efficient member of the commission. Carried.

The resignation of William Smith, a parish clerk for St. Martin's, was received and accepted.

Councillor O'Brien moved that the sum of \$10,000 be loaned to the Parish of Lancaster for highway purposes, the sum to be repaid in ten annual instalments of \$1,000, each with interest at 6 per cent. interest only to be paid on unpaid principal. This sum to be expended for highway purposes in the section from the corner of Randolph, from Malloy's corner to Pleasant Point Ferry, and in support of his motion he pointed out that the sum available for highway purposes from that district was \$1,500, and the largest sum payable under the proposed scheme was \$1,500. This was carried by Council.

Councillor Thornton expressed the opinion that the council should place itself on record in some manner as to the repairing of the old court house or the building of a modern structure.

Councillor Hayes moved that the council be given authority to secure full information regarding the cost of repairing the old building and that of a new and modern building. This was seconded by Councillor Hayes and carried.

Council then adjourned to meet at ten o'clock this morning to deal with the survey of the lots proposed to be expropriated on White street.
