There is a fine opening in Africa for Canadian goods, and it is well known that if Canadian traders are early in the field at the close of the war, when the country again settles down to business they will easily secure the larger portion of the trade. 

Crossman has made his report for 1901 of the amount of lumber surveyed at the port of Bangor, and the figures show a great falling off from former years, the total for the year being the smallest since 1876. Programme Will Be Completed Ten Years Earlier Than Originally Planned.

Washington, Jan. 7.—According to official reports received in Washington, Germany's shipbuilding programme, which was to have been completed in 1908 instead of 1916, will now certainly be finished in 1906. This means that within four years Germany will have a navy consisting of 38 battleships, of which 31 are built, building or authorized; 14 armored cruisers, of which 12 are built, building or authorized; 38 smaller cruisers, of which

There will be a large increase of commissioned officers for the German navy during 1902. It is proposed to add to the list one vice admiral, three captains, 10 commanders and lieutenant commanders, 8 lieutenants of the second class. 28 senior lieutenants of the second class. ants of the second class, 28 senior lieutenants and 18 junior lieutenants, making the total increase 74.

BRITISH ADMIRALTY TROUBLED.

Afraid a Training Ship at Newfoundland Would Benefit Uncle Sam.

Toronto, Jan. 7—(Special)—The Tele-gram's special cable from London says: 'Sir Charles Dilke, at a meeting of the Shipmasters' Society, made a speech re-terring to the admiralty sending a train-ing ship to Newfoundland. He said the admiralty were troubled lest they should be spending money to increase the effi-ciency of American seamen, indicating that the colonials might be induced to wander into Uncle Sam's navy after they had received their training."

DOMINION BY -ELECTIONS.

425, 13,059 bushels arrived from foreign ports, but the great bulk of last year's arrivals came during December, or since the rise in price, 11,953 bushels having been received during that month.

The high price of potatoes in the Baltimore market is the cause of the importations. Foreign white potatoes rarely come in when the price is less than \$1 per bushel, but those now in the market are selling at \$2.50 per sack of 165 pounds, which is less than three bushels—a bushel weighing 60 pounds—making the price about 85c. a bushel. The foreign potatoes have to pay a duty of 25c. per bushel. toes have to pay a duty of 25c. per bushei. They are in rather better demand, it is said, than domestic potatoes, for the reason that they "run" regularly as to size. Some complaint has been heard that the domestic potatoes this season have not been well culled. The crop has been short, and it is also stated that some dealshort, and it is also stated that some dealers have bought up potatoes and stored them, in anticipation of high prices, as a speculation. If severe weather should prevent shipments there would, it is asserted, be a stronger tone to the market, which has become rather easier in consequence of the foreign arrivals.

The continuance of potato importations appears to depend wholly upon the state of the local market. Domestic white potatoes of the best quality sold at the close of the week wholesale at 80 and 85c. per bushel, and second quality at 65 and 70c.

More than 75,000 tons of "torfmelasse-futter" are annually fed to cattle in Europe. This compound with the long name is a mixture of "melasse," the residue from the beet sugar making process, and peat. Now a process has been discovered by which sawdust can be substituted for peat in combination with "melasse."

Sawdust, it appears, is more nutritious than straw. For plenty of nitrogen, birch sawdust is the thing; for albumen, poplar heads the list; for fat, pine beats them all; walnut sawdust leads in wood fiber. In each one of these elements straw is inferior to sawdust.
