INVESTIGATIONS IN KAMCHATKA.

Ethnologist of Jessup Exploration Party Brings Interesting Information.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 20.—Vladimir Bogoraz, ethnologist of the Jessup expedition party, who is returning shortly to New York to report upon the results of his investigations in Kamchatka and neighboring regions, informed the Associated Press correspondents here that he found indisputable connection between the American Indians and the Paleo-Asiatic races on the Bering Sea coast, in Kamchatka, and the headwaters of the rivers which rise in the Stanovoi mountains.

Is a Vancouver Man and of the 2nd Mounted Rifles—Injured Monday, Imprisoned, Then Gorse—Recruiting Field Hospital Corps.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 7.—(Special)—Capt. J. E. Leckie, of the C. I. R., who sailed from Vancouver, is to receive the distinguished service order here. This officer, who is known in his west as "Captain Jack," is one of the most popular officers of the second C. I. R. He has made many friends here during his previous and present visits, a number of whom are delighted to see his gallantry rewarded. Captain Leckie served with Strathcona's so well that his work commanded attention and earned the coveted D. S. O. The presentation will be made by the lieutenant governor at officers' mess of the First Regiment Canadian Artillery, Thursday evening.

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SAYS THE WORLD IS GROWING TEMPERATE

Prohibition Leader Returns from Trip Round the Globe, Studying Conditions.

Chicago, Jan. 7.—That the world in general is advancing toward temperance is the belief of John G. Woolley, the prohibition leader, who has just returned from a seven months' trip around the globe. His trip was taken for the purpose of studying the condition of the liquor traffic in foreign lands. On his long trip Mr. Woolley addressed more than 90 temperance meetings, speaking against rum in Australia, whisky in Scotland and Kava in Honolulu. The islands of the South Seas visited by Mr. Woolley in his study of social conditions included Hawaii, Samoa, Tutuila, New Zealand and Australia. On his return trip he visited Ceylon, France, England, Scotland and Wales. Mr. Woolley says that "among all the greater nations I feel sure that America is at present the farthest advanced in the struggle for prohibition."

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MARCONI'S INDEPENDENCE.

NOT WORRYING AS TO ARRANGEMENT WITH LAND TELEGRAPH.

Says if Companies Will Not Handle Business To and From Coast, He Can Deliver His Messages Overland by Wireless System—Will Know Before Long.

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—(Special)—Signor Marconi will leave here tomorrow. Asked as to whether he had made any arrangement with the existing land telegraph companies for the delivery of the messages received from Europe and the handling as far as the coast of business originating in Canada for the new enterprise, he answered: "I have been discussing the matter with the government but am not yet able to speak for the government as to the outcome of this meeting. One thing is certain, if I am not able to come to terms with the telegraph companies, I can deliver my own messages, for the wireless system. We shall know long which is to be utilized."

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


Illustration of a human head showing the ear and surrounding structures, used to illustrate the effects of head noises.
