XMAS MUSIC AT ST. ANDREWS.

There was a large congregation at St. Andrew's church last evening, when the special Christmas music was rendered, as per programme published in Saturday's "News."

The first anthem, "And there were Shepherds," was somewhat marred by the organ motor stopping, which nearly spoiled Miss McCully's solo. Mr. Adam Hall sang the bass solo in this number, most effectively.

Next followed the Quartette, "An Angel's Serenade," from the cantata of "The Nativity," in which Mrs. R. G. Strathie sang the contralto solo. It was Mrs. Strathie's first solo in the church, and the large congregation present, were both surprised and delighted, with her beautiful, full, and sympathetic voice.

Miss May Conrad sang "The Babe of light and glory," by Dressler, with taste and intelligence. Miss Jean McKenzie played the violin obligato to this number.

The anthem, "The Prince of Peace," was splendidly given by the full choir.

Many thought the anthem, "Brightest and Best," by Rubensin, the gem of the evening. Mrs. McKenzie sang the solo in this number, in her usual good style, her voice was flexible and sympathetic, and her enunciation almost perfect.

Altogether the choir sang four Christmas hymns, and a carol, "It came upon a midnight clear." The decorations were of holly and spruce, together with potted plants and festoons of smilax.

The two young ladies who are taking the Kindergarten course, and assisting Mrs. Patterson this year, Miss Claire Faulkner, of Truro, and Miss A. Y. Marchant, of Brooklyn Street, Kings Co., entered into the spirit of the whole affair with an ease and readiness not often attained so early in the course.

As the staff of assistants is smaller than usual, Miss Conrad, who is a graduate of the Truro Kindergarten, very kindly consented to help in the music, and added much to the success of the entertainment.

Miss Morton, who graduated in June last so creditably, has had charge of the Kindergarten during the greater part of last week, in Mrs. Patterson's absence at the Teachers' Institute at Great Village, and her manner of conducting the exercises on Friday, reflected great credit on herself, and gave promise of much success in her future work.


