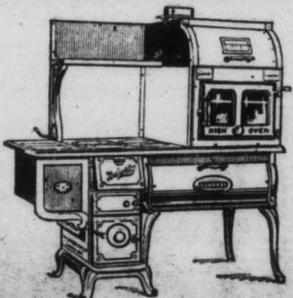

District and General.

At Grace church, Bothwell, on October 31st, Ellen, youngest daughter of Mrs. J. Marcus, was united in marriage to Melvin Kahn of Walkerton.

The girls of Newbury are forming a knitting circle for the purpose of spending one evening a week in knitting socks, visiting the various homes of the members.

Miss Lizzie Evans of Thamesville met with a nasty accident when she fell into part of an old cistern at the back of her house. She was severely shaken up but is able to be out again.

Fire destroyed the fine barn of John F. Simpson, at Ridgetown, including fifteen tons of hay and a team of horses valued at \$800. The fire is supposed to have started from spontaneous combustion.

Parkhill women have started a "drive" on the farmers of Middlesex which has for its immediate objective the securing of one thousand fine chickens which the women were to prepare and send to the boys in the trenches in time for Christmas.

Owing to the late rains many acres of beans are rotting on the ground in Orford township. What promised to be good crops in the summer were in part destroyed by the early frosts, and now the farmers are finding it almost impossible to save what was left.

There has been an increase of slightly more than 50 per cent. in the number of automobiles in actual use in the Dominion at the present time over the total for 1916. According to statements from the provincial cities, the cars in use in Canada now total approximately 176,000.

Another of the old residents of Dunwich passed away at his home north of Dutton on October 26 in the person of Archibald McLean, at the age of 65 years. He was a son of the late Alexander McLean, who settled in Dunwich in the forties, and was born on the farm on which he died.

Daniel Kane of North Newbury died on Friday last. He was an old citizen of the community, having resided there for upwards of fifty years. He leaves a sister, Margaret, and nephews and nieces. The funeral was held at the Roman Catholic church in the Roman Catholic church and cemetery in Wardsville.

Frank McDonald of Ridgetown was last week given a life term in Kingston penitentiary for manslaughter. He was found guilty at the assizes in Chatham of having five and a half years ago removed a section of the rails on the M. C. R. track near Ridgetown, which resulted in the wreck of an express train and the death of Stephen Quinlan and Russell Oakes, engineer and fireman.

During the past season the farmers around Grinan had a serious time to harvest crops on account of the scarcity of labor. Many women were forced to work in the harvest. Several of them assisted in the hay fields with the loads of grain in the fields. One woman built over seventy loads during the season, while several others took the places formerly occupied by the hired men on the farms.

Writs were issued at Ottawa on October 31st calling for a general election on Monday, December 17. Nomination day is fixed for Monday, November 19. This applies to all constituencies except Yukon Territory. In the Yukon, nomination day will be December 31 and polling day on January 28. All writs are returnable on February 27, 1918, and Parliament is summoned to meet on the day following.

The funeral of John Howe, aged 38, C. P. R. brakeman, who was killed at Medicine Hat, was held at Strathroy on Monday. He resided at Glen Oak, and the funeral was attended by a large number of friends from that section. Brakeman Howe fell off a train and sustained injuries from which he died soon after in the hospital. Besides his wife he is survived by three children. He went west about ten years ago.

Coming.

"The Birth of a Nation," D. W. Griffith's massive spectacle, coming to the Opera House, Glencoe, Saturday (matinee and night), November 24, is the largest and most important production of a decade, yet not a word is spoken throughout the performance of nearly three hours. Music supplies the absence of speech, mechanical effects and realism, while the wizard of the screen, David W. Griffith, unfolds in 12,000 feet of film the thrilling romance of the war between the States and the Reconstruction of the Southland. Some idea of its magnitude may be had from the fact that the staging of this great "outdoor" drama cost half a million dollars.

Several of the actors are of Southern lineage. Henry Walthall, who plays the heroic roll of the little Confederate colonel, is a member of the well-known Walthall family of Alabama. Miriam Cooper, who appears as Margaret Cameron, is a direct descendant of Charles Carroll, the Maryland signer of the Declaration of Independence. Mr. Griffith is the son of a Brigadier General of the Confederate army.

For every character, however small, Mr. Griffith has found just the personality needed. After that his masterly direction made each one give a perfect characterization of the widely varying roles. The result was not acting but life itself. Such realism is never seen in the old-fashioned stage. The limitations of the theatre were swept away for Nature was Mr. Griffith's stage. Panoramas after panoramas are revealed to the astonished eyes of the spectator. The most inventive imaginative imagination could hardly picture to itself such scenes of splendor.

Victory Loan Meeting.

At a meeting held in the town hall on October 31st to organize a canvass in Glencoe for the Canadian Victory loan, Mr. Graham of Toronto outlined the method of procedure, and stated that the canvassers must devote three weeks of their time from Nov. 12 to Dec. 1 in canvassing. To the advisory committee already appointed at a meeting in London on October 27, consisting of the reeve, the treasurer and the clerk of the village, were added J. E. Roome, A. McPherson, P. D. Keith, W. D. Moss, J. A. Scott, J. N. Currie and R. C. Vause. On the county executive committee were appointed J. A. McLachlan and L. Sulter, on the publicity committee A. E. Sutherland and J. N. Currie, and on the publicity committee for the public school E. T. Huston. James Poole and W. A. Hagerty were suggested as the team to canvass the village.

Council Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of Glencoe council was held on Monday evening. Members present—A. J. Wright, reeve; J. E. Roome, A. McPherson and W. A. Hagerty, councillors. At the request of the county treasurer \$100 overpaid on arrears of taxes

in 1916 was, on motion of McPherson and Roome, order to be refunded.

A tender for erecting cement water tank as advertised in summer was received from Wm. Stevenson at \$300 and was accepted on motion of Hagerty and Roome.

W. D. Moss and J. A. Scott, on behalf of the Patriotic Association, requested a grant of \$20 towards the British Red Cross funds, which was granted, on motion of McPherson and Hagerty.

On motion of Roome and Hagerty a grant of \$25 was made to the Moss and Ekfrid Agricultural Society.

On motion of Roome and McPherson the clerk was authorized to order Government fish required by merchants who wish to handle them, the council to guarantee payment for the same.

On motion of Roome and Hagerty Mr. Thompson was instructed to put in a crossing asked for by Mr. Parrott, the latter agreeing to furnish the gravel.

A number of accounts were passed for payment, after which the council adjourned to meet again on Monday evening, December 3rd.

The affirmative was supported by Misses Marion Huston and Corinne Howe, the negative by Misses Florence Westcott and Martha McRae. The judges decided slightly in favor of the affirmative. Duet by Misses Annie George and Muriel Precious; reading of the "Oracle"; critic's report by Miss Marguerita Garner. The meeting closed with the National Anthem.
