BILL BE EXPLAINED
BY J. E. ARMSTRONG

Measure Would Put Shipping
Rates Under Railway Com-
mission

OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—Mr. J.E. Armstrong, member for East Lamb-
ton, is leaving to-morrow for Winni-
peg where he will be the guest of the
Board of Trade of Winnipeg. At a
luncheon on Thursday, Mr. Arm-
strong has been invited to the Western
Metropolis to explain the bill,
which he has introduced, which pro-
posed to place the control of rates of
shipping to inland waters under the
control of the Dominion Railway
Commission.

While the industrial conference was
in session the Winnipeg delegates,
representing the Board of Trade, re-
ceived wires asking them to oppose
this bill. They had a conference with
Mr. Armstrong, when the bill was
explained by him to them. They
felt that before the Opposition should
be pressed, Mr. Armstrong should
have an opportunity to explain the
bill to the West and the invitation
was the result.

AFTER HIGH RENTS

Windsor Council Appoints Fair
Rental Committee

WINDSOR, Sept. 29.—At to-night's
brief session of the City Council a
"fair rental" committee was named by
the mayor who will investigate charges
of profiteering by Windsor landlords.
A number of glaring instances were
cited by his worship where landlords
after renting their houses and tenants
had taken possession were ordered out
because the owner declared he had
been offered a higher rent.

Ald. Jackson, Wood, Warren and
Jacques are members of the committee
and victims of landlords are asked to
furnish them with any complaints
they may have.

NITTI SUSTAINED BY 208 TO
140 AFTER TUMULTUOUS
DEBATE

ROME, Sept. 28.—Premier Nitti
was given a vote of confidence by the
Chamber of Deputies, which continued
in session last night. The Govern-
ment received 208 votes to 140.

The assembly was extremely tumultu-
ous. There were personal encounters
between several of the deputies.

For some weeks past the Nitti Gov-
ernment has been under fire from vari-
ous sides, including the Nationalists,
Socialists and military party over the
policy adopted in regard to Fiume.

May Take Action If Italy Fails
to Control Situation in a
Few Days.

Paris, Sept. 27.—The peace confer-
ence is apparently changing its atti-
tude toward the Fiume situation which
many members no longer regard as a
strictly Italian affair because of in-
dications that the Jugo-Slavs are being
involved and likewise the reports of in-
creasing claims by the Italians in re-
gard to the Adriatic, creating conditions
which are regarded as holding the
threat of a Balkan war.

TWO NEGROES SHOT
BY WHITE MEN

Taken From Officials by Alabama
Mob and Shot to Death in Wood
Montgomery, Ala., Sept. 29.—Two
negroes, Miles Phifer and Robert
Crosby the latter a discharged sol-
dier, were taken from county officials
about five miles from Montgomery late
to-day and shot to death by a mob of
25 masked men. Both negroes were
charged with having assaulted white
women.

The two negroes were being taken to
the state prison at Wetumpka for
safekeeping when the mob held up the
automobile carrying them. The mob
forced the county officers to surrender
their arms led the negroes into a wood
and opened fire on them with shot-
guns and pistols.

Parliamentary Visitors to Wind-
sor Tell of Big Plans

WINDSOR, Sept. 29.—More than
\$75,000,000 will be spent in
building a dam and laying out im-
provements at Ojibway, the Cana-
dian Steel Corporation's projected
city, on the Detroit River, below the
city of Windsor.

This information, it was learned to-
day, was handed out to the Parlia-
mentary delegation that visited Win-
dors on an inspection tour last week.
Owing to labor conditions not much
work will be done for a time, however.

Merlin Farmer Chosen by Con-
servatives at Chatham.

Chatham, Sept. 27.—At a conven-
tion of the Liberal-Conservatives of
West Kent, held in the L.O.O.F. Audi-
torium this afternoon, Milton Shaw,
a well-known farmer and grain buyer at
Merlin, was nominated to represent the
Heard Government in the coming pro-
vincial election. Three names were
placed in nomination, Milton Shaw,
W.J. Spence, M.P.P., and Rev.
George W. Spence, rector of Holy Trinity
Church. Mr. Spence had signified his
willingness to accept the nomination of
the temperance platform, providing
there were no other contestants for the
nomination. Mr. Shaw, however, was
induced to allow his name to stand,
and his nomination was made unani-
mously.
