gardener's care. And more than this, he has the faculty, given to the few, of putting these lessons in a form that will attract young readers. That is the reason why these Fifty-two Sunday Morning Addresses to Children must have been listened to with delighted attention, by the boys and girls who heard them. And other boys and girls will read them, now that they are in print; which is the highest praise we can give.

Alongside of Mr. Dowsett's book may be placed, Pastures of Tender Grass: Sixty-six Short Sermons to Young People, by Rev. Charles Jerdan, M.A., LL.B. (Oliphant, Anderson and Ferrier, Edinburgh, and London, 427 pages, \$1.75). The descriptions given of historic persons and places will be read with interest for their own sake, while, under the magic of Mr. Jerdan's illuminating style, the truth to be made clear or the lesson to be enforced grows out of the story as naturally as the plant springs up from the soil.

It is a long call to 1847, when Mr. and Mrs. Geddie left Prince Edward Island for their far distant mission field in the South Seas. It is a longer call still to 1839, when John Geddie went down to Antigonish with Sir William (then plain "William") Dawson as best man, to claim his bride. But Mrs. Geddie is still living in a bright, busy old age. The whole church, east and west, will be glad of the collection of her letters made by Miss McCulloch, a closely packed booklet of 71 pages, with portrait of Mrs. Geddie. The letters are very vivid, and the additional stories by Mrs. Geddie's daughter, Mrs.

The Adult Bible Class, by Rev. A. C. Crews, General Secretary of Sunday Schools, Methodist Church, Canada (William Briggs, Toronto, 118 pages, 25c.), is a concise and comprehensive treatment of the Adult Bible Class Movement in its general features, and in the detail of class organization and work. Dr. Crews' little volume will give valuable assistance in the answering of three important questions: Why should we have an Adult Class? How shall we go about organizing one? How can it be made to go?

Primary teachers in the Sunday School and mothers in the home, will find many a helpful suggestion in, Lesson Stories for the Kindergarten Grades of the Bible School, by Lois Sedgwick Palmer (The Macmillan Company, New York, The Macmillan Company of Canada, Toronto, 127 pages, 75c. net). This little book contains a full course of lessons in the general subject of, God the Workman, The Creator and His Works, and shows how kindergarten methods so successful in the day school can be employed in bringing the fuths and teachings of the Bible home to the minds of little children.

The Superintendent's Handbook and The Teacher's Handbook, 1909, by J. W. Axtell, each vest pocket size, 131 pages, 35c., come from The Cumberland Press, Nashville, Tenn. They are pithy and practical—equal to the preceding volumes under the same titles; and that is high praise.



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
