**STEAMER DOMINION  
SHEATHED IN ICE**  
**a Rough Passage From  
Louisburg.**

**Say They Have Not Been Warm for  
Days—The Dominion Has 5500  
Tons of Coal.**

A coal steamer Dominion docked at the Dominion Coal Company's wharf at this afternoon. The steamer sailed the harbor completely covered with ice which had formed during the storm Monday night. The Dominion came from Louisburg with a cargo of 5500 tons of coal. She weathered the storm well, no accidents having occurred. Monday night's storm, as reported by one of the crew on the Dominion, was a terrible one. The seas were mountainous and more than once swept over the steamer. One did not have to be told this, as a look at the vessel would convince that a hard storm in the harbor had taken place. Ice formed in inches thick all over the Dominion. The masts, booms and decks were covered and one of the decks did make a capital skating place. The seamen were all glad to get in and one stated that he hadn't been warm for days. Work was started at discharging the coal shortly after the steamer docked.

**SARDINE SEASON WAS  
ALMOST A FAILURE**

BACHIAS, Maine, Dec. 5.—A decrease of one half from the season of 1906 is shown in the total receipts from sardine and herring season of 1907. The reason for the heavy shrinkage is said to be due to the low market price for domestic sardines and to the scarcity of herring in American waters. Comparatively few of the factories here are now operating this year and discouragement is over next season's outlook. The portance of the sardine and herring industry is shown by the figures of 1906 when Washington and Hancock counties, the centre of the business, realized about \$5,155,000.
