

desirable to issue, when the interests of the Indians may be consulted in sending them to a particular Station at the time they may not conform to the schedule. - Thus should it be found advantageous to the Indians to receive one kind of Blanket instead of another, and convenient to the Indian Dept. to include it in the issue, or one kind of cloth for another. The L^t Governor will always sanction a deviation so obviously advantageous. - An account of the cost of the cloth - An account of the cost of the cloth may be estimated at the end of the year, and balanced by a deduction in the next ensuing issue.

I am directed to acquaint you that the L^t Governor thinks it better to employ to employ the Indians in building their own Houses. Two carpenters have been engaged at St. J. Bay to be under your direction. A contract may be made by you for timber sufficient to build ten Houses in the first instance. This is merely experimental, and if found too expensive will be discontinued. - A sufficient quantity of lumber may be purchased immediately to enable the Carpenters to commence their work. Carpenters.

George Boyd and George Edwards are engaged to work under Mr. Clark Superintendent of the Indian Department at Murray Town and the River Thames. They are to be employed in erecting Log Houses for the Indians under the direction of Mr. Clark who will furnish Indians to assist them. As they have tools to take up they are recommended to proceed by the Welland Canal & Gravelly Bay, and to proceed from there by the Steam Boat to Port Stanley and St. Thomas from which latter place they will be able to procure a Wagon to convey them to Mr. Clark, who resides at the Village of Colborne and the River Thames and who will employ them on their arrival there for three Months certain at St. Heloise Cemetery, per diem - And if they work steadily for that time a portion of their expenses up will be paid, and very probably they will be employed for a longer period.
