(h)" Continuance of heavy taxes on high incomes, increased death duties, a levy on large accumulations of wealth. He might have some of these resources, but how all? A capital levy would destroy both inheritances and high incomes and all private surplus."

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M.J.Coldwell, The Canadian Club, Hamilton, Oct. 19, 1942. (a) "I think, in this country, we are too apt to want a detailed blueprint of things to come. I am quite free to say this to you. I believe any detailed blueprint that we could have made, we will say, in 1920, would be rather laughed at today. Or any detailed blueprint we could have made in 1930, the onset of the depression, would be out of date today. Any detailed blueprint of social and economic change would be out of date by the time the war ends."
