There is not the same impediment to immediate legislative action in the fields of health protection and social security that exists in the field of employment. If the government is prepared to accept a health insurance scheme that will be administered provincially, there is no constitutional obstacle to its immediate enactment. It might be considered whether it would not be desirable, in exchange for federal assistance to provincial health insurance, to ask the provinces to give up their jurisdiction over old age pensions, so that the federal government might put them on a contributory basis. If this could be done, the old age pension contributions could be offset against the compulsory savings under the income tax, and a measure of relief from taxation afforded without any decrease in revenue during the war.

No single measure would do more to provide a national minimum of social security than the establishment of a
