Sir David was bred by Messrs. Bell, Woodfield, Annan, The two-year-old Border Laird, still by Sir Andrew, is out of a Harvester mare, and a yearling cold, Kirkstyle, waye, ab by Austring to the Rear-tie's own grand.
