WINNIPEG, MAN.—Walter Chesterton, architect, is this week taking tenders on additional storey to Haverall College.—Stewart Mulvey wants tenders by 26th inst. for alterations and improvements to Carlton school.—D. Smith wants tenders by 23rd inst. for brewery and malt house for P. Shea.—The Northern Fuel Company have taken tenders on new building, hot water heating.—It is understood that the Canadian Bank of Commerce are considering plans for an extensive new building.—W. B. Lait, architect, has prepared plans for double house for Mr. Browning, corner Carlton and St. Mary's avenue.—Architect Chisholm has completed plans for brick and stone Presbyterian church at Arcola, cost \$5,000, also brick Methodist church at Sperling, cost \$3,000.—The city will purchase a new dynamo and 50 arc lamps, at an approximate cost of \$9,000.—The Western Implement Co. have purchased a factory site in Fort Rouge.—Blackwood Bros. have had plans prepared in Milwaukee for a large brick brewery to be built in Fort Rouge.

OTTAWA, ONT.—J. W. H. Watts, architect, has prepared plans for Presbyterian church to be built by the Glebe congregation, cost \$20,000.—W. D. Morris has purchased property between Mosgrove street and Mill Lane on which to build large coal-storage sheds.—M. Plouffe, chairman Fire & Light Committee, desires tenders by 25th inst. for 1,000 feet of 2½ inch double jacket, cotton, rubber-lined hose.—Plans have been completed for the reconstruction of the Hotel Cecil on an enlarged and elaborate scale.
