## RED SOX GO DOWN BY 5-2

Heck Busted Gero in Fast Game at London—Errors Cause Trouble.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—Yesterday the fans of London were enabled to witness Heck winning his 20th game this season, when he held the Brantford team to six hits, winning a victory which savored much of Heck's ability, as he not only hurled well but drove in the tying run and scored the winning run himself, carrying off the day's batting honors with three blows out of four times at bat. The game at the end of the hour and 30 minutes of play was 5 to 2 in Mr. Heck's favor.

Interest was not lagging, as the fans are confident that London is working to their utmost to give Ottawa a battle for the 1913 honors, and the large crowd present to witness yesterday's game speaks well as the fixture was against the tailenders.

By yesterday's win Heck tops the best at the last pitcher in the Canadian League, having won 20 and lost four games for the percentage of 89.

### Keps Hits Scattered.

Two lonely hits came in a bunch in the third inning, along with a base on balls and an error, gave the visitors their only runs. The other four bingles were so widely scattered that only Coose reached third again and that on an error in the sixth.
