PEACE TALK CONTINUES IN GERMANY

Most Violent War Organs Favor It For "Reasons of Humanity."

President of Reichstag Boasts That Germany Cannot be Starved.

Berlin, Dec. 1.—Peace talk continues in Germany, and has been taken up by the press throughout the empire. A significant statement issued by Dr. Solf, the Imperial Colonial Secretary, in which he seeks "no more than an honorable peace with the guarantees of a happy future," is being widely quoted and approved. The most violent war organs are joining in this trend of comment, although they insist that Germany seeks peace "only for reasons of humanity."

The Vossische Zeitung says: "We gladly associate ourselves with the honest aspiration of a speedy peace to which the North German Gazette recently gave expression on behalf of the Government."

ADMITS SHORTAGE

In opening the Reichstag yesterday the president, Dr. Kaempfer, after referring to the victories of the German armies, said: "Proud England is troubled about the key to her supremacy. All our enemies have recognized that we are invincible on the battlefield; so the more eagerly do they cling to their hope to destroy us economically, to conquer us by hunger. As they allow themselves to be deceived regarding our financial strength, which has been proved by the astonishing results of our war loans, so they have also been deceived in their estimate of our economic strength."

"We have corn for bread, Potatoes, the most important food of the people, are abundant. If in other things there may be a scarcity, as cannot be disputed, the hardships thus caused to a majority of the poorer population will be surmounted by the organization of the provision market. We, therefore, financially and economically, have every reason to contemplate the future with firm determination and unshaken confidence."

The Finance Minister presented a bill for the taxation of war profits, urging a speedy discussion so that none could escape the tax. The bill was referred to committee.

RELIGIOUS BOOKS TO HUN SOLDIERS

An Association Supplies Them With Booklets Which Say They Fight for God.

Aix-la Chapelle, Germany, Nov. 30. (Correspondence of The Associated Press.)—Soldiers of the German army are being supplied by a religious association here with a booklet entitled "Father, I Call Thee." It contains prayers suitable for various military emergencies and explains to the soldier in simple language his religious duty while on service or in danger.

In the preface of the book the reader is told briefly and eloquently that he is fighting "with God for Emperor and Fatherland" and that the German soldier is the representative of the sacred and religious cause. "For a long time," says the preface, "our enemies have been looking on us with envy, and it is their act which has brought this war upon us. We German men can count on Gods help, and he will crown the righteous cause with final victory. Therefore go forward in full confidence that heaven will shield you from the enemy."

God helps the brave. You have pledged yourself to the Emperor by your military oath. Show that you are obedient to your superiors in the obedient to your superiors in the minutest detail, for they are the Emperor's representatives. Do not be led astray into disobedient ways. Never betray under any circumstances a military secret, such as the movements of troops, and even should you go into imprisonment in an enemy's country, never divulge anything for Emperor and Fatherland.

Kingsway Sun.

London, Dec. 1.—The British steamship Kingsway has been sunk. Her captain and 21 members of the crew have been landed. Five others are missing.

There are three British steamships Kingsway of 3,647, 247 and 211 tons gross respectively. The first of these is the only one whose movements are being recorded, and presumably is the vessel which has been sunk. She was 346 feet long, was built in Sunderland in 1907 and was owned in Bristol.
