LARDED LIVER AS SERVED.
(By Caroline Coe.)

Have the butcher slice calves' liver not too thin. When cut up put it into two quarts of cold water, in which put a teaspoon of salt. Allow to remain one-half hour, drain and wipe dry. Cut strips of salt pork a finger long and about a quarter of an inch thick, cut holes in each slice of liver with a sharp-pointed knife and stick out each side an equal distance. When they are all "larded" put them into a warm skillet. Set over the fire and fry again for ten minutes so as to give every part of the liver equal heat. Twenty-five minutes is about the time required for cooking it. Take up each piece, draining grease. If you desire gravy put the skillet back over fire with two tablespoons of the drippings and add two tablespoons of dry flour. Stir rapidly to keep from scorching and keep stirring until every lump has disappeared. Turn into the fat and pour 2 cups of cold milk, stock or water, boil 5 minutes and serve by turning over the larded liver. A fine dish for either luncheon or dinner.

FIG HARVESTING.

Several Methods of Forcing the Fruit Are Used.

The season for gathering the figs in Italy joins hands in October with the vintage, but it really begins in August, owing to a curious system of culture.

Early in August the fig gatherers squirm through the twisting branches from tree top to tree top and "oil the fruit." These fig people are nomadic; they appear and disappear like the wandering harvesters of France. Late in July the masserie are rented to them, a stated sum being paid to the proprietor, a payment that gives to the fig gatherers the right to all the fruit, beginning with the figs and ending with the last cluster of grapes.

Rude huts thatched with straw are built by the proprietor in all his orchards, and in these the gypsy-like harvesters live with their families. Sometimes they supplement their narrow quarters with a ragged tent. Three sticks placed crosswise and a kettle in the croch constitute the kitchen.

Shortly after their arrival the work of forcing the fruit is begun. The method employed are curious. A wad of cotton is dipped in olive oil and gently rubbed on the flower end of the fig. Fig by fig is thus treated, and in eight days the fruit is ready for the market.

Another method consists in gathering in the spring the half-formed fruit, which is strung on ropes. These ropes or garlands are thrown over the branches of trees and are allowed to decay under the burning sun. There is born in this decay an insect that pierces the growing fig and induces rapid maturity.

The fig, when perfectly ripe, exudes a drop of honey-sweet juice at the nether end, which never falls, but hangs there, a standing temptation to children and to bees. When fresh picked at this stage the fig has a rich flavor entirely lost in the dried fruit.—New York Sun.

Remedies That Will Enable You to Get Rid of Them.

Powdered borax and pulverized alum sprinkled underneath the paper on shelves or around their haunts.

Balsam of Peru is good. Rub a thin film of it near the bottom of the table legs or on the floor, and renew the application in three weeks. In addition, boil one ounce of the balsam in a gallon of water for thirty minutes, and then sponge this, while hot, over the woodwork and floors.

Oil of sassafras has many advocates. The method of using it is rather unique. One is to note the trail the ants follow—'tis said they form a trail in travelling to its beginning. Then saturate a small cloth with the oil and apply to every portion of the distance covered. Pour the oil into any cracks from which they emerge—the oil is sure death to them.

Cleanliness is essential. In order to protect pastry in the pantry while you are getting rid of them, insulate it by raising it on four inverted cups set in canisters filled with water.

FISHES IN STRATA.

Deep Sea Denizens Have Each Their Range.

When a disaster occurs at sea, and people read that some leviathan has gone down to the utmost depths of the ocean, imagination is stirred in wondering what conditions surround her.

According to Sir John Murray, one of the greatest authorities on oceanography, the bottom is a desert of pitch-black darkness, penetrating cold and eternal silence. Worms, sea puddings, and coral polyps sluggishly crawl, or sway in the almost currentless depths, and only two species of fish, both of them small, with much head and little body, have been found deeper than a mile and a quarter down.

The range of fishes in the sea is as though it were divided into layers, one above the other, and no fish can live above or below this layer. Thus many of the deeper fish—three-quarters of a mile below the surface—have been found floating at the top. They had swallowed a fish as large or larger than themselves, and its buoyancy had lifted them out of the strata to which they were accustomed.

The physiology of a bottom fish is almost impossible to know, because they are built to resist a tremendous pressure of water, and when this pressure is released—as when they are brought to the surface in a net, sometimes the fish has burst; the organs are crushed beyond reconstruction.

Similarly, if a fish of a higher stratum attacks a bottom fish in the neutral zone where both can live, and—as sometimes happens—his teeth become entangled so that he cannot let go, and he is dragged into deeper water he strangles instantly, for his breathing arrangements are of no use to him under the pressure of water in the lower strata of the sea. As a rule, however, the fish of the various depths rarely feed on those above or below them.

There have been brought to light an astonishing number of forms of fish, and especially of prawns of a brilliantly red color, living in the ocean at a depth of 3,000 feet. But, astonishing as it may seem, these brilliantly colored fish and prawns, instead of being conspicuous in the water at that depth, are nearly invisible, when almost any other color could be easily seen.—London Tit-Bits.

TALKING TICKER.

A Machine That Saves the Trouble of Reading.

George R. Webb is the inventor of the new talking ticker, which is thus described in the World's Work:

"There is a talking ticker now, a machine that will entertain and instruct you for twelve hours on a stretch with the gist of the day's political speeches, baseball scores, election returns and any other news that seems important. It will tell you all this in your home as soon as you could find it out if you stood in front of the newspaper bulletin boards, and when there is no vital news to tell it will entertain you with rags and grand opera. When you go to the station the same machine will tell you when your train leaves or what track your friend's train is coming in on. When you go abroad it will help your feeling of security on shipboard, for it enables the captain to give simultaneous orders to all the crew no matter where they are. All these things are true if you happen to live in the right apartment-house in Wilmington, Philadelphia, Baltimore or New York, if you go to the right station, and if you go to sea on the right ship, for the magnifying glass that does all these things is new and has not yet had time to be very widely adopted. The news service is accurate and speedy. At least once every hour the bulletins are read over the lines. From every available source the news comes into the central distributing station."

WATCHING US GROW.

One of the wonders of the twentieth century is the development of Canada. During the year ending March 31 it attracted over 40,000 immigrants, of whom no less than 18,000 were from the United States. The country is now the very flower of Western agriculture communities. To keep up with this astonishing progress one of its railroads, the Grand Trunk Pacific, has planned the purchase of rolling stock valued \$5,000,000, and another, the Canadian Northern, has an equipment programme that will require the expenditure of \$20,000,000 in the next three years. One item calls for 40,000 freight cars. Despite the great disparity in population, there is now more railroad construction in Canada than in the United States. "The Lady of the Snows" wanted a long time for her day, but it is now here with a rush, and she is making the most of it.
