CHATHAM GRAIN MARKET.

Douglas Stevens, of the Kent Mills, gives The Planet the following:
Wheat—Market steady; very little moving. The mills are paying 65c. The rain for the past few days has improved crops wonderfully and there will be a good average yield. Kansas expects to harvest 85 million bushels of wheat. As a result the prospects are that the price of wheat, although it may strengthen for a few weeks, will ultimately go lower.

Corn—Market weaker. Dealers are paying from 36 to 38c a bushel.

Oats—Market gradually going lower. The demand has dropped off.

Beans—These are holding just about the same. The Detroit market holds firm.

Barley—The bottom has dropped clean out of the market. There is no demand for it.

BOARD OF HEALTH

The City is Free From all Contagious Diseases

Except Measles—Trouble Over a Ditch on Sheldon Avenue.

The board of health met yesterday afternoon. (There were present:—Chairman Dunlop, Dr. Baker, O. B. Hullin, Bishop Hill, Medical Health Officer, and Inspector Guttridge.)

The medical health officer reported as follows: Since your last meeting a few cases of measles have been reported, but no other cases of contagious diseases. The shipping of hogs at the G. T. R. is still the subject of numerous complaints and the board should have nothing undone to remedy the nuisance, which will be a growing one, probably, with the heat of summer.

An open drain has been constructed on Sheldon Ave., extending from a point near Cornhill street to Poplar street. It is quite deep for an open ditch and is so constructed that the drainage from an adjacent cow byre spreads itself out stagnant in front of adjacent dwellings, and in the disgust, breeding flies and by foul emanations jeopardizing their health. I would recommend that the board order a six-inch or eight-inch tile drain there in place of the open ditch. Received.

A petition, signed by Wm. L. Fife, Mrs. Sarah Bishop, Mrs. D. S. Weaver, N. B. Eber, W. W. Wainwright, Charles Brooks and G. A. Thompson, was presented to the board. The petition was from the ratepayers on the west side of Sheldon Ave., and was a protest against the culvert put in across Sheldon Ave. to drain on the north side of Wilson Ave. Received.

R. S. Dunlop reported for the committee appointed to meet the water commission in re river pollution. Mr. Dunlop said that the committee had looked into the matter and found every care taken at the waterworks, so the committee had not thought it necessary to meet the commissioners.

On motion of O. B. Hullin, seconded by Bishop Wainwright, the report of Mr. Dunlop was accepted.

Dr. Hall's report was taken up.

O. B. Hullin wanted to know how much pipe it would take to put in the sewer recommended by Dr. Hall.

Dr. Hall said the distance was about a block and a half.

City Clerk Merritt—I might explain that the ratepayers first notified the council and they referred the matter to the board of works.

Dr. Hall said the ditch complained of was 12 feet deep but it had been poorly constructed and had no fall. The barnyard had been undrained for a long time and the drainages spread out in the ditch. If the board of works takes action, the parties benefited will have to pay for it. The engineer says there will be sufficient outlet.

Dr. Baker moved that the recommendation of Dr. Hall be complied with. The motion carried and the board adjourned.

THE C. C. I. BOARD

All Present Teachers Will be Offered Re-engagements.

Some of Them Get Increases of Salaries—The Star Course to be Made Still More Attractive.

There were present at the meeting of the C. C. I. board yesterday afternoon, Chairman J. E. Thomas and J. C. Fleming, Thos. Scullard, Rev. Dr. Battistia, C. J. O'Neill, Edwin Bell and J. W. White.

Accounts were passed from the T. H. Taylor Co. \$100; Rev. Dr. Battistia, \$125; R. C. Burt, \$113; Remington Typewriter Co., \$225.

Principal Peterson submitted a full and detailed report of the star course series of the past season, enclosing financial report. The principal concluded his report as follows:

"The large and ready sale of season tickets, the liberal patronage given, the warm interest manifested and the educational and recreational character of the entertainments in general, warrant me in saying that these courses are meeting a real want in the community and are proving to be a valuable auxiliary to the ordinary work of the school. In the light of past experience even better results may be obtained in the future. I respectfully ask the board to appoint one or more of its members to act on the lecture committee of the next season."

The report was referred to the committee on internal management.

SALARIES INCREASED.

Chairman Bell reported—Your committee on internal management having considered the question of re-engagement of teachers for the ensuing year beg to report as follows:

The committee recommend that all the teachers be offered a re-engagement at their present salaries respectively except that the following members of the staff should have an increase in their yearly salary as follows: Mr. Lane \$100, Mr. Jewett \$50, Mr. Black \$50, Mr. Mowbray \$30.—Report adopted.

The report of the comparative examination record of the educational department was submitted. It says—In the same year (1899) Chatham C. I. pupils won fifteen first-class honors at the university matriculation examination—a record surpassing that of all other schools in the province but London C. I., which has seventeen to its credit.

The first class honors won were, three in English, three in mathematics, two in classics, four in history, two in French and one in German. Besides, Chatham had 22 candidates at the Junior Leaving and second class teachers' examinations, ranking fourth in this respect among the 37 collegiate institutes in the province. This may fairly be called "a maximum of results and a minimum of expenditure."
