## WITH THE BOERS

Things Seems to be Going Very Badly Just New.

They are Everywhere B ing Driven Before the British-Many Le rest into German Territory.

London, Sept. 14. - The War Office has received the following from Lord Roberts:-

"Pretoria, September 12. — Meth-uen attacked Varma's camp at Ma-lapoo Sunday, and dispersed the ene-my. He took 30 prisoners. The Brit-ish had six wounded. Several Boers were seen to fall and many riderless horses were noticed.

were seen to fall and many riderless horses were noticed.

"General Buller is at Kupgat, and is driving the Boers before him. He has captured several tons of food. The Boers destroyed a gun tackle, and thirteen wagons of ammunition to prevent their capture by the British. The Mounted Infantry which started from the Ventersburg road station attacked the enemy at Cypergat kopattacked the enemy at Cypergat kop-jes on Sept. 9, and captured cattle and horses that had been stolen from

and horses that had been stolen from the farmers. The British casualties were two killed and two slightly wounded.

"Hilyard reports that he drove the enemy from Lankwaithe pass on Sep-tember 10, and followed them through the pass on the way to the hills east

of Utrecht.
"The British officers who were cap The British officers who were captured by the Boers were fairly treated. The food furnished to the noncommissioned officers and men, however, was inadequate in quantity and inferior in quality. The inhuman freatment of the sick prisoners reflects the greatest discredit on the flects the greatest discredit on the

Boer authorities."

Lord Roberts also reports from Machadodorp, under date of Wednesday, September 12, that General French was heavily engaged that day with the Boers in the hills west of Barberton and that General Funtan had gone to General Hutton had gone to General French's support. Great Britain and Germany Decline to Evacuate.

London, Sept. 14.—Great Britian's reply to the Russian proposition for the evacua-tion of Pekin, was sent two days ago; and Great Britain declines to evacute Pekin prior to receiving satisfactory guarantees from the Chinese Government for the ful-fillment of certain conditions. There is a general disposition here to accept as mainly correct the statements that all the powers have now replied to the Russian proposal, that Great Britain and Germany have declined to evacute Pekin, that Austria and Italy have decided to be guided by Germany's decision, and that the others have a more or less modified with agreed to a more or less modified with-drawal, as defining the attitude of the
