


COOKERY COLUMN.

Some Attractive Ways of Using Left Over Vegetables.

The average cook has just begun to appreciate the possibilities for good contained in vegetables aside from the "plain boil." She has been accustomed to regard them solely as a kind of unimportant accompaniment to meat and scarcely in themselves worth the trouble of any separate pains in preparation. Then, too, the remains of delicate vegetables left over from dinner are frequently regarded as of no consideration, when, as a matter of fact,

a little ingenuity transforms them into

very appetizing hot or cold dishes. A number of dainty little salads are made with a few odds and ends of vegetables in combination with a small quantity of poultry, fish or meat. Roast veal, for instance, may be cut in small pieces, without skin or gristle, mixed with a double quantity of cucumber, tossed in a dressing composed of lem-on juice, oil, pepper and salt and served in the center of a bed of water cress



or lettuce. Such dishes, if insufficient in quantity, may be eked out by the addition of hard boiled eggs cut in quarters, while mayonnaise lends to the attractiveness of vegetable salads.

Eggs In Baked Potatoes Eggs in baked potatoes are an at-tractive vegetarian dish suitable for luncheon or breakfast. Select fairly large potatoes of an equal size. Wash and bake them until soft. Allow one egg for each potato. Separate the whites from the yolks, keeping the yolks whole. Beat the whites to a stiff froth. When the potatoes are sufficiently cooked cut a round hole in the top of each and scoop out the inside.
With this beat the stiff whites of the eggs and an ounce of melted butter to each four potatoes. Season with salt and pepper and return to the skin, leaving a hollow in the top of each po-tato. Into this drop the yolk of an egg, sprinkle the top with brown erumbs and one or two tiny bits of butter. Return to the oven long enough to set the egg. Serve very hot. If this is considered too much trouble, the baked potatoes are very nice simply scooped out a little and the whole egg dropped in and returned to the oven for a few minutes.

Chicken and Green Pea Salad. Any kind of poultry lends itself to the concoction of dainty little salads

with cold vegetables. For instance cut the white meat of chicken into neat pieces and mix with an equal quantity of cold green peas. Heap it in little shells and serve with mayonnaise or with a dressing composed of oil, vinegar, pepper and salt.

The New Towels.
The woman who is deft with her needle may indulge in pretty towels, whether her purse is long or not, for there is no end of handwork used to beautify towels in these days.

One of the prettiest methods and at the same time one of the most practical is scalloping. The plain huckaback is got and the ends done in the simplest form of scallop, heavily padded. With a quarter to mark the line drawn across the end to keep them even the marking may be done at home. Instead of the fringe so popular a

few years ago many of the handsomest towels are finished with a hemstitched hem or with embroidery or with Irish lace, although the latter is very ex-

The very large towels are out of fashion, the favorite size being about twenty-five inches wide by forty long. Hand towels come in several sizes, the smallest of which is fourteen inches

wide and twenty-four long.

Drawn work as a trimming for towels offers numerous possibilities to the woman who can do it well, and so does embroidery work. Both Irish and Gerembroidery work. man embroidery are popular. All em-broidery is of the variety known as blin, and the designs are not too elab-

Centerpiece Holders.
Some one has invented a pretty treatment of the broomstick cr the pasteboard mailing tube which so many women have found the mest satisfactory thing to wind centerpieces and doilies around when they have just

A twenty-five inch square of flowered dimity is edged with narrow lace or bound with wash ribbon or with one of the many pretty wash braids and at-tached to the tube, which has been covered with cotton batting in which sachet powder has been freely sprin-kled and then with the material.

The doiles are laid flat upon the square as soon as they have thoroughly aired after ironing and are loosely rolled around the tube, both doilies and outer covering kept from unrolling by inch wide ribbons attached, one in the middle of the roll and one mach site. middle of the roll and one on each side
