CONSULS IN CANADA

REPRESENTATIVES OF JAPAN AND
RUSSIA IN THE DOMINION.

Sketches of Mr. Tatzoro Nosse, Consul-
General of the Japanese Government,
and of Mr. de Struve, the Consul-Gen-
eral of the Russian Government in Can-
ada—Their Respective Colonies and
Their Personal Habits.

The Japanese colony in Montreal is
not quite large enough for celebrat-
ing purposes, writes B. K. S. in To-
ronto News. There are eleven of
them all told, and they range from
the distinguished diplomat who oc-
cupies the Consulate-General to a
few of his fellow-subjects, who are
acting as confidential servants to
Montreal citizens, and they include
the representatives of a couple of
Japanese exporting houses, who are
among Montreal's most intelligent
business men. Under such circum-
stances it could hardly be said that
there is any Japanese society in this
city.

Curiously enough, the Russian Con-
sul, who has thousands of subjects
of his Imperial Majesty the Tsar
within his territory, and several hun-
dreds within a mile of his consulate,
is in exactly the same position of
social loneliness as the representa-

tive of the rival power. The Rus-
sians in Montreal are almost with-
out exception Hebrews, members of
a race with whom the orthodox Rus-
sian can have no dealings. Of Rus-
sians of the Eastern Church there are
never more than a dozen in Montreal
any, most of them are birds of pas-
sage. The Russian Consul looks
faithfully after the interests of the
31,231 Russians—Hebrews, Douk-
hobors and sectarians of one kind or
another—in the Dominion, but he
cannot very well feel any sentiment
of fellow-nationality for them. His
position is probably the more lonely
of the two. The Japanese is assimi-
lative, cosmopolitan, the Russian is
reserved and strongly national.

Both consulates are well known to
the official circle of Montreal as
scenes of hospitality. But the Jap-
anese consulate has its little circle
of intimates—mostly members of the
inner ranks of the Van Horne set—
among whom Mr. Tatzoro Nosse is
a hall fellow well met. Small, alert,
energetic, typically Japanese in es-
sentials, and a thorough man of the
world in externals, he is very much
in demand just now as an authority
on war rumors.

Mr. Nosse has some knowledge of
the seat of war. He was an assist-
ant Consul at a Korean seaport in
1885, in the early days of his diplo-
matic experience, and in 1888 be-
came Vice-Consul at Chese Foo, which
consulate then looked after the port
of Newchwang. In 1892, as a re-
ward for brilliant services, he was
made a full-fledged Consul, and sent
back to Corea, where he remained
throughout the Chino-Japanese war,
receiving the companionship of the
Order of the Sacred Mirror, with a
war medal and an Imperial Red
Cross medal. In 1895 he was ap-
pointed Japanese Consul for the
whole of Canada, with headquarters
at Vancouver. In 1899 he went back
to Corea as Consul-General, which
position he only left to establish the

The Japanese Consulate is one of
the most delightful homes to which
the social personages of Montreal
can secure entrance. Mr. Nosse, in the
course of his immense experience
with the foreign trade of Japan, has
acquired the taste and instincts of a
connoisseur of Oriental art, a hobby
by which he and Sir William Van
Horne have pursued together with
great enthusiasm. The consular re-
sidence, one of the old mansions on
Beaver Hall Hill, is a perfect trea-
sure-house of Oriental workmanship.
Exquisite tapestries line the walls,
lacquer cabinets and ancient Japane-
se pottery are everywhere, and even
the office is designed and finished in
the lavish simplicity that the Japane-
se know so well.

Madame Nosse is the only Japane-
se lady in Montreal. She would,
however, be a leader of society were

ever she might happen, for she has
all the graces of Oriental hospitali-
ty. The Consul's two daughters he
has not yet introduced to the strenu-
ous life of the West; they are at
boarding school in Tokio.

There is a sharp contrast between
the representative of little, alert
Japan and that of the tremendous
northern bulk of Russia. But Mr.
de Struve is typical of only one
phase of Russian character. In an-
other walk of life he might very con-
ceivably have been a Nihilist. He
has the face and gentle abstracted
manner of a dreamer of dreams. The
course of his life has given him
dreaming a somewhat practical turn,
but he is not by nature a practical
man. All his life he has wandered
from capital to capital, studying
mankind, their modes of life, their
methods of dealing one with another,
commercially and otherwise. The
"great European question" interests
him passionately, not as a subject
of philosophic speculation is his hob-
by, but man personally interests him
very little. But for his duties and
his devotion to economic and political
studies he would be a recluse. His
house, while well known to the
"official set" and popular with them,
because of the unfailing geniality, the
kind and the soft, appealing voice of
its master, is not known to the out-
side world, and is not a social cen-
tre.

If Mr. Nosse's tenure of office be
dated, as it should be, from the
time of his appointment to the con-
sulate for Canada when it was situ-
ated at Vancouver, Mr. de Struve is
the youngest of the consular body of
Montreal. He was appointed in
1899, while acting as Vice-Consul at
Frankfort-on-Main, Germany. Since
he came here he has been one of the
most active of foreign representa-
tives in the pursuit of information.
He has visited all the Canadian sea
ports, and all the Russian settle-
ments. He is a Doctor of Letters of
the University of St. Petersburg, and
though only 42, has also the title of
States-Adviser, a civil service dig-
nity which is rarely earned before
middle age. He has visited every
capital in Europe except Madrid and
Lisbon, and he talks with fluency in
six languages—English, French, Ger-
man, Serbian, a dialect of Polish and
his own tongue.

HAMLET TERCENTENARY.

How Shakespeare's Memory Will Be Fe-
stinated at Elsinore.

At Elsinore, Island of Seeland, where
the historic Prince of Denmark is
supposed to have lived, is to be cele-
brated next spring the tercen-
tary of the publication of
Shakespeare's "Hamlet."

The memorial to be erected for the
occasion will be a statue of the
poet, the work of Louis Hasselriis, a
Danish sculptor. Shakespeare will be

represented in a sitting posture with
an open book before him and pen in
hand.

According to Danish tradition, the
scene of Hamlet's, or Amleth's, life
has been definitely located at the
Castle of Kronborg, Elsinore, on the
ramparts of which the ghost walked.
This castle is very ancient, but
it is doubtful if it has been stand-
ing since the time of Prince Amleth,
on whose life Shakespeare's creation
is supposed to be founded.

Near the castle is a garden that is
called Hamlet's garden and is said
by tradition to be the very spot
where his father was killed. In a
corner of the garden is a rude pile
of stones that is pointed out as
Hamlet's grave. In sight of the
castle walls is another spot of equal
interest. It is the bed of the old
stream where, tradition relates,
Ophelia was drowned.
