HOSPITAL DRIVE COMES NEXT WEEK (Continued from first page)

This is the first appeal directly alhough the Hospital has been in existence for over twenty years. Private contributions. County and Town aid, and generous assistance from The L. P. Fisher Estate have enabled us to carry on. But we have now reached a stage where it is impossible to meet the demand for proper accomodation. Even with the recent addition of a Nurses' Home, housing eighteen hurses, and the utilizing of all available space, we are faced with a waiting list.

In order to secure better service for the public through better methods of administration and staff work, there has been inaugurated a system of Hospital standardization throughout Cat ada and the United States, bringing all Hospitals up to a recognized standard without which they cannot obtain recognition or support from governing bodies.

We, are, therefore, faced with the louble necessity of immediately providing for all those demanding treatment and also improving the institution to the point where we can be assured of obtaining Government assistance. To this end it is necessary to im-

prove our present plant and enlarge our premises. Appended is a statement prepared after careful consideration, showing the amount of money required to bring this Hospital to a point sufficient to meet immediate requirements of such standardization. And we believe that with these im provements and extentions, which will provide a much greater revenue, this Institution can be made practically self sustaining.

To show that hospital accomoda tion is becoming increasingly neces sary, we need only noint to the fact that our neighboring towns in New Brunswick and Maine have been spending large sums of money to this

nd and we feel that the residents of Carleten County, who were the first to establish a Hospital on the upper St John, will not be found lacking in the support of their own institution.

To raise this fund of \$56,000 it has put on a drive the week beginning October 24 under the direction of the Trustee Board with the co-operation of the Councillors of the different parishes. Collectors will make an effort to call on every home to solicit contributions which can be made payable

in four instalments extending over a period of twelve months. All cheques and agreements to be made payable to R. L. Daniels, Treasurer, Mgr. Bank of Nova Scotia, Woodstock. If collectors should be unable to call on you, kindly mail entributions direct to


