Apparently the American Chamber of Commerce in London has begun to realize that the penalty against the pound sterling is gradually forcing Europe out of the American market. In a statement issued yesterday the Chamber has come to the conclusion that Great Britain faces a year of unprecedented trade if the nation is successful in escaping further labor troubles, and American business men are urged to invest in foreign securities and enterprises, in order to balance the adverse exchange. In the meantime John Bull is looking for fresh fields and pastures new without undue concern about the value of the sovereign on Wall Street. He is also cultivating the home market and urging the curtailment of imports as a stimulant for the home producer.

## RAILWAY DISPUTES IN CT. BRITAIN SETTLED AT LAST

A Minimum Wage of Sixty Shillings a Week Has Been Decided Upon With a Further Increase Next September if Living Costs Should Rise

London, Jan. 2.—The long wage dispute between the Government and the Railway Unions seems to have been settled, with victory apparently on the side of the railway men.

Details of the new offer by the Government which the National Union of Railwaymen accepted, will be announced on Sunday next. In broad outlines they amount to a minimum wage of 60 shillings a week for the lowest grade of workers, some of whom previously have been paid only 50 shillings, with a proportionate increase for the men of higher grades. Under the plan, should the cost of living increase before next September, wages will be increased one shilling for every five per cent. rise in prices. After September, there will be a sliding scale varying with the cost of living.

## TARIFF REVISION IS NOT LIKELY

Says London Truth As Long as the Present Union Government Remains in Power.

London, Jan. 2.—Discussing the Canadian tariff revision, Truth thinks that traders here need not expect much one way or the other from it, as the Union government is quite as protectionist as any during the last 40 years. There is a popular demand all over Canada today for a general reduction of high protection duties, Truth declares, in order to relieve the high cost of living, but there is not likely to be any concession to this as long as the Union government can hold itself in office.

"Present indications, however," continues Truth, "are that the days of tariff legislation at Ottawa, conceived solely in the interests of a class, are coming to an end. The agrarian revolt which threatened at least four years before the war, has taken definite shape since the armistice. The new movement is thriving and extending in seven provinces. Its opponents, the protected manufacturer and careerists of the Conservative-Liberal parties, are now afraid that at the next federal election the agrarians will secure control of the commons. There will, in that event, be at once a reduction of duties which are inevitable for it was the burden of the tariff that provoked the electoral revolt which is now so seriously disconcerting to manufacturers as opportunists and professional politicians."

## NEW YORK SUFFRAGETTES ALLOWED TO GO FREE

New York, Jan. 2.—Magistrate Corrigan dismissed charges of disorderly conduct against the three women who were arrested on Christmas Day while attempting to parade Fifth Avenue in a demonstration for the release of "political prisoners."

The defendants were Miss Gladys Griner, daughter of J. P. Griner, of Baltimore, a member of the United States railway commission in Russia, Dr. Gertrude Kelly, and Miss Mary Duffy.

## NO SEPARATE TRIALS FOR CENTRALIA ASSASSINS

Montesano, Jan. 2.—Separate trials for the 11 alleged members of the Industrial Workers of the World, charged with murder in connection with the Armistice Day shooting at Centralia, Wash. have been denied by Superior Judge John N. Wilson.

Hearing of the application for a change of venue to Tacoma, was continued until tomorrow morning.

## CABINET SHUFFLE MAKESHIFT ONLY

The Resignation of Maj.-Gen. Mewburn as Minister of Militia is Announced Among Other Changes.

Ottawa, Jan. 2.—The new year has brought forth at its very inception a further somewhat extraordinary shake-up in the cabinet. The rumored resignation of Major-General Mewburn from the position of minister of militia has materialized and that member of the cabinet will on January 15 retire to his own private law practice at Hamilton. General Mewburn gives as his reason for retiring the fact that he joined the government for the period of the war and a reasonable period thereafter, and that demobilization having been completed he has finished his work.

The resignation of General Mewburn has been accompanied by a cabinet shuffle. Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration and colonization, succeeds General Mewburn as minister of militia and the department of which Mr. Calder was head since its creation is now without a minister. It is rumored that the department will again be absorbed in the department of the interior under Hon. Arthur Meighen. It is further probable that the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, which intends shortly to abandon vocational training, will be merged into the militia department, and Sir James Loughheed either secure another portfolio or be relegated again to the position of minister without portfolio.

Hon. Martin Burrell, secretary of state, who has been slated for retirement for some time past, has taken over the vacant department of customs, and Hon. A. L. Sifton, who recently abandoned the latter portfolio to take public works, has now become secretary of state. Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways, will be acting minister of public works as well. The shuffle is most manifestly but a makeshift and cannot be said to strengthen the government to any degree. It will serve to tide the government over until the House meets and caucus is given an opportunity to decide the fate of the government.
