## FARM AND HOUSEHOLD.

-Ninety-nine thousand acres have been planted under the new arbori culture act in Kansas.

-Keep the horse collars clean. The dust and dirt which adheres to collars when they are wet with sweat works into lumps and ridges, and sore shoulders are the result. If the collars become hard wash them clean, pound them and apply oil.

-Pieces of cotton batting dipper in hot water and kept applied to old sores or new cuts, bruises or sprains, is the treatment now generally adopted in hospitals. A sprained ankle may be cured in an hour by showering it with hot water, poured from a height of three feet.

-The Utica Herald tells of a dairyman who was troubled with the smell of garlic or wild enions in the milk. To obviate this he put the cows in the stable at about 3 o'clock each afternoon, and fed them on hay and gave grain as usual. The result was all he anticipated. A rest of three hours allowed the scent to pass off in other secretions though previously it flavored both milk and butter.
