

SEVEN CASES SMALLPOX.

Outbreak of the Dreaded Disease at Chatham—Was Brought From Maine.

Premier Tweedie this morning received a telephone message from Chatham to the effect that there are now seven cases of smallpox there.

According to the advices received by the Premier the disease was brought to Chatham by a man who came to Chatham from a lumber camp in Maine. He did not say that he had come from an infected camp and entered the hospital there for treatment for a sore foot.

It was later discovered that the man was suffering from smallpox.

Dr. E. B. Fisher returned to Marysville on Saturday night from a trip to Chatham. Dr. Fisher is secretary of the Provincial Board of Health and went to Chatham to diagnose suspected cases and to take steps to prevent the spread of the disease.

When Dr. Fisher left Chatham there were two sure cases and one doubtful case. The disease is of the mildest type, Dr. Fisher says.

Dr. McDonald is in charge of the patients.

A Chatham dispatch says:—"On account of an outbreak of smallpox churches and schools have been closed, and all public gatherings prohibited until further notice, by order of the board of health."

The houses containing disease, besides all persons who have come in contact with the patients, have been quarantined, and several stores fumigated."

CHATHAM, April 10.—There are no new cases of smallpox reported today. The Board of Health are making very strenuous efforts to prevent a further outbreak. The County Board of Health too are taking steps to look after suspects in the county districts. Many claim that disease is only chickenpox.

ON A SERIOUS CHARGE

Albert Kelly of Bear Island Was This Morning Remanded

Charged With Stealing Goods Valued at \$24

Blackville Man Had Several Charges To Face—Common Drunks.

Albert Kelly was arrested yesterday at Bear Island by Constable J. H. Hawthorn charged with having stolen from Simon A. Goodine's residence a number of articles as follows: A gold watch chain, value \$8; gold pin, value \$1.50; silk handkerchief, value \$1.50; pair of pants, \$5; one \$5 gold piece; felt hat, value \$2; and a pocket book, value \$1; making a total value of \$24. The warrant upon which he was arrested states that the theft was committed between September and January last.

This morning Kelly, who is a young country looking fellow, was before Col. Marsh in the police court and remanded until Tuesday morning for trial as the witnesses will not be present until then.

Adam Beck of Blackville was arrested on Saturday night by officer Rideout at the Lorne Hotel. He put up quite a fight but was finally taken to the police station on a wagon. Something like two years ago Beck got into prominence for another fight with the police. He was today charged with being drunk, violently resisting arrest and indecently exposing his person and Col. Marsh imposed a \$10 fine or 30 days jail.

Two common drunks were released upon depositing \$5 each.

LOGS ARE ALL RIGHT.

No Trouble Expected When the Badly Rotted Ice Bridge Moves Out.

The water in the river is rising, the ice is rotting quickly and the indications are that the time is not far off when the river will be clear of ice. No trouble is anticipated when the ice goes out as it is now practically nothing more than slush.

The ice is now held by the bridges. It moved here yesterday for a few yards and below the railway bridge the river is clear on the other shore as far as Robinson's point.

Robert Elliott, foreman for the Boom Company, reports that so far as can be told about 800 or 900 logs were forced between the piers and out of the Sugar Island boom Friday. These logs were all caught in the Douglas boom immediately below and no further trouble is expected.

The ice jam at Springhill moved about 50 yards yesterday.

BANK MANAGER DEAD.

J. H. Abbott Was Manager of Royal Bank Here at One Time.

Moncton, N. B., April 9.—The death occurred at Amherst at 9 o'clock to-night of J. Harry Abbott, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at that place.

Mr. Abbott was manager of the Royal Bank in Moncton for a number of years, and had a wide circle of warm personal friends here, who will learn of his death with sincere regret. Previous to coming to Moncton, he was manager of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax, now the Royal Bank, at Richibucto, where he was stationed for quite a number of years. He was transferred to Ottawa from Moncton and two years later was sent to Amherst to open and manage the new branch.

[Mr. Abbott was manager of the Royal Bank here for several months at the end of the year of 1893 and has many friends in this city.]

A MONTREAL STRIKE.

Employees of the Street Railway Have Grievance They Want Settled.

MONTREAL, April 10.—There are rumors of another strike on the Montreal Street Railway. The chief cause of trouble is the spare men, who claim that the Company is running such a small service that they get practically no work. They claim the service is only every five minutes instead of every two and a half minutes as required by the franchise. Complaint is also made against the low wages, 17 cents per hour. The men demand the same rate of pay as in vogue in Toronto, which is about two cents per hour higher. The payment of 50 cents per month into the fund is also a grievance, as the men claim they do not stay with the company long enough to get any benefit from this fund.

G. T. SHOPS CLOSED

One Thousand Men Out of Work While Repairs Are Being Made.

ST. THOMAS, April 10.—The G. T. shops were closed down on Saturday till further orders, the reason given being that it was necessary to clean the boilers and overhaul the machinery. Master Mechanic Patterson stated there was no connection with the trouble as to machinists wages in the shops. Between one thousand and eleven hundred men will be temporarily thrown out of work. The close down will not interfere with the plans for the shops enlargement going on.
