Progressive Revolt Against Hughes Worries the G. O. P.

Developments in Many States Indicate Bull Moose is Not in Political Cemetery, Though Voting Strength is a Matter for Speculation.

New York, July 20.—The Progressive revolt against amalgamation with the Republicans is worrying the managers of the Hughes campaign. Assuming that the Bull Moose was resting peacefully in the national political cemetery, the Republican leaders believe that certain victory was assured in November. But now there is doubt whether the Bull Moose is resting at all. He certainly is not resting peacefully. And he certainly is not in the cemetery, says the New York Herald.

Interest naturally centers in the Progressives. Measured by their vote in the 1912 election, they can easily swing the election either way. No one is so rash as to predict that the Bull Moose vote of next November will be anything like half of the vote of 1912, but unless something is done to placate the radical leaders in a dozen or more states it is very evident that the Republican national ticket will lose a huge block of votes which it has confidently expected to get.

Opinion differs widely about what strength the Progressive party could develop. Before the Chicago convention it was conceded by the Republicans that if Theodore Roosevelt ran as the head of the third party ticket again, the defeat of any ticket the Republicans might nominate was a foregone conclusion.

But Mr. Roosevelt is out of it. He has endorsed Mr. Hughes. To the surprise of a good many of the Republicans, his endorsement has not had the magical effect it was expected it might have. He apparently is despised now in some quarters where but a short time ago he was idolized. A reasonable proportion of the rank and file of the Progressives indicated an intention to follow him back into the Republican party, but a good many of the Progressives have attacked him for his so-called "betrayal" of the party which he organized.

One extremely distressing feature of the situation is the ability of the Progressives to get funds to keep their going. The withdrawal of George W. Peck as the Progressive Bull Moose leadership has not left the organization destitute of funds. Reports have reached the Republicans that the withdrawal of Mr. Peck was intended to bring about a split in the party, and that their surest path to victory again lies through another split; and to bring this about it is reported the Democrats are ready to do everything in their power to keep the Progressives alive.

The Progressives in 1912 polled 4,119,507 votes. That was 634,651 more than the vote for Mr. Taft. Doubts Response to Call. There was hope in the minds of most of the local Progressives Monday whether the appeal of John M. Parker for another national convention and a national ticket will be headed. Mr. Parker was nominated for vice-president at the Progressive convention in Chicago in June. Mr. Roosevelt was expected to be his running mate, but he withdrew. Mr. Parker is one of the most ardent members of the Progressive camp.

He says he wants to continue the national party and will be ready to withdraw as second man on the ticket to give place to someone else. The Progressive National committee was clothed with power to fill vacancies on the national ticket, but that body is in favor of supporting the Republican ticket, so unless the Progressives get together in convention again there will be no Progressive nominee for President. If necessary funds are assured, it is reported, the Progressives may as-
