## THE CANADIAN MINISTER TO U. S.

Appointment Not Likely to Be Made Until After U. S. Elections

Ottawa, Oct. 4.—It is semi-officially stated here that there is no truth in statements made in American and British papers that the delay in the appointment of a Canadian minister plenipotentiary to Washington was being delayed because of objections made by Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador.

Sir Auckland Geddes has not interfered with the appointment in any way. The facts of the situation appear to be that as there is nothing in the situation so urgent as to call for an immediate appointment, it has been thought better to wait until after the election campaign across the line is over. While nothing definite has been decided yet as to who will be appointed, it will first be offered to Sir Robert Borden, and it is not known what his decision will be on the matter. Acceptance would throw open the constituency in Kings, N. S., where the Farmers' party is very strong.

## FUND TO COMBAT WAGE LOWERING

Manchester, N. H., Oct. 4.—Delegates from Canada and the United States are meeting at the 20th annual convention of the United Textile Workers of America which opened here today. Questions to be considered are the raising of a fund to combat any attempt at lowering wage standards, methods to extend the 48 hour working week until its application becomes universal, and the advisability of conducting a "non-political, non-partisan" campaign in the United States for election in November of candidates friendly to labor.

## LIKELY TO FILL SENATE VACANCIES

Ottawa, Oct. 4.—Six vacancies in the Senate are expected to be filled shortly. The vacancies are divided among the provinces as follows: Ontario—2, British Columbia—1, Alberta—1, Saskatchewan—1, Nova Scotia—1.

## MARCHED TO WAR WITH HUSBAND

Raritan, N. J., Oct. 4.—Mrs. E. A. Siles, 82, who, with close clipped hair and a uniform, concealed her sex and is said to have fought beside her husband through the Civil War, died here today.

The war call found the young couple on their honeymoon. The husband, Martin Siles, joined the ranks of the Fourth New Jersey Infantry, and when the regiment left, Elizabeth Siles marched beside him. She fought through many engagements, it is said, and was mustered out, undiscovered. The husband died several years after the war.

## WHEAT CHEAPEST SINCE 1917 TODAY

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 4.—Severe new breaks in the price of wheat resulted today from an increase of country selling. March deliveries went under \$2 for the first time since the crop and December dropped also to a new low level. Figured on the basis of the premium of the hard winter grade over the December delivery, wheat today was cheaper than at any time since 1917. Opening quotations, which ranged from 2 to 3 1/2 cents down, with December 2.04 to 2.04 1/2 and March 2.00 to 2.01, were followed by a moderate rally and ended with a drop much under the initial bottom prices.

## CARL WANDERER ON TRIAL FOR LIFE

Chicago, Oct. 4.—Carl Wanderer went on trial for his life today charged with the murder of his young wife and a "ragged stranger," whom Wanderer tricked to his death to substantiate a story of an attempted hold-up.

Mrs. Wanderer, who was soon to become a mother, and the stranger, were shot to death in the hallway of Wanderer's apartment. Wanderer said the man had attempted to rob him, and had shot Mrs. Wanderer. He then killed his wife's assailant, he said.

## AMERICAN FLOUR PRICES TAKE DROP

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 4.—Flour prices continued their downward trend when mills effected a reduction of ten to sixty cents a barrel for family patents here today. One large mill's quotation was reduced from \$12.15 to \$11.55 a barrel, while another which lowered its price half a dollar Saturday made a further cut of ten cents, making its price \$11.20 a barrel. The low wheat market is responsible for the decline, millers said.

## STEAM FITTER MAY GET BIG REWARD

Leon Konkel Gave the Information Which Led to Arrest of Florean Zolenaka

New York, Oct. 4.—Leon Konkel, a steam fitter, the man who gave the Pittsburgh authorities the information which led to the arrest there last night of Florean Zolenaka, of Brooklyn, in connection with the Wall Street bomb explosion, arrived here from Pittsburgh to tell his story to the federal authorities.

He told agents of the Department of Justice that while he was traveling from Cincinnati to Pittsburgh with the suspected man, the latter had informed him that he had explosives in his suitcase and gloated over the Wall Street explosion.

Konkel said that he had him arrested after he had seen dynamite in his traveling companion's suitcase at a hotel in the Pennsylvania city.

If Konkel's information leads to a solution of the New York disaster he is eligible for the \$20,000 reward offered for tips leading to arrest of the guilty parties.

## TO TAX THE KAISER

The Hague, Oct. 4.—The Dutch government, after a long investigation of the former German Emperor's resources, has decided he must pay taxes on an income of 1,500,000 guilders per year.

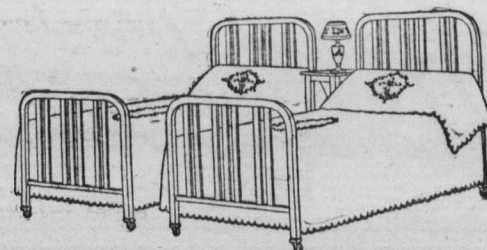
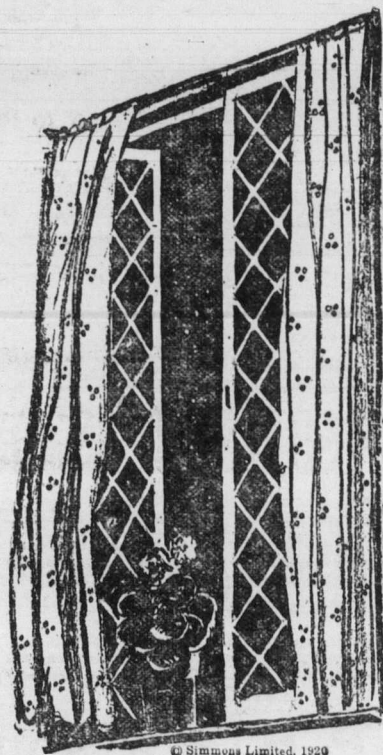
