REGULAR MEETING TOWN COUNCIL.

Mayor Miller Chosen to go to Help Chatham Get The Exhibition Grant.

BILLS PASSED.

Suggestion That Board of Health Purchase Its Fumigating Materials Direct.

The regular meeting of the town council convened on the 17th, with Mayor Miller in the chair. Aldermen present:—Belyea, Doyle, Falconer and Morrissey.

His Worship read a communication from J. D. Creaghan, a director of the Miramichi Agricultural Society, urging the town council to assist the Society in endeavoring to gain for the latter the government grant of \$50,000 for next year's Dominion exhibition.

Ald. Morrissey and Doyle moved that the council send the Mayor to Ottawa to assist the Chatham delegation and that \$50 be voted towards paying his expenses.

Ald. Belyea thought that the council should wait to see what move the Board of Trade should make, and he moved an amendment to that effect.

Ald. Morrissey said that the exhibition in Chatham would benefit Newcastle and the rest of Miramichi as much as it would Chatham. He thought the town was under great obligation to the Mayor for the latter's selflessness in going to Ottawa with the last delegation and laboring for the interests of Miramichi entirely at his own expense.

Ald. Belyea thought that there was very little prospect of a town of 5,000 people getting the national exhibition. If there was one chance in a hundred of succeeding, he would favor the sending of a delegate at once without waiting for the Board of Trade to decide.

Mayor Miller said that the exhibition grant for 1909 must come to New Brunswick and that the choice lay between Fredericton and Chatham, with chances in favor of Chatham.

The amendment was not seconded, and the motion carried.

A report from the Board of Health showed that in May and June there had been eleven cases of scarlet fever with three deaths, and in October several other cases with one death. Most of the latter cases are still under quarantine. Typhoid fever has been rather prevalent during the last few months, but no deaths have been reported. All or nearly all the cases have been in families using other than town water. One case of diphtheria was reported in June, but the patient recovered and the disease did not spread.

The Mayor said that a large item in Board of Health bills was that of formaldehyde, supplied by the druggists. He understood there was an immense profit. The Board of Health should purchase the formaldehyde themselves and supply it at cost for fumigating purposes.

On recommendation of the Finance Committee a list of taxes amounting to \$152.00 was ordered cancelled as non-collectable, and the following bills were ordered paid:

On motion, Mayor Miller was appointed delegate to the county council with Ald. Morrissey as alternate.

The Police and Appointment to Office Committee brought in a report strongly recommending the keeping of the day policeman. Report was adopted.

Ald. Morrissey suggested that His Worship enforce more strictly the rules of order, especially regarding the respect due him from the aldermen.

Alderman Falconer and the Mayor severely censured the absent aldermen. The Mayor said that he would proclaim disqualified any alderman absent three nights in succession. Adjourned.

OBITUARY

W. J. RUSHTON.

W. J. Rushton, one of the best known I. R. C. men on the northern division, passed away at his home in Moncton, on the 25th. The deceased was a son of the late Mr. Enoch Rushton, and was born at Westchester, Cumberland County, sixty-one years ago. He came to Moncton with his parents in 1866 and went to work as a carpenter in the I. R. C. shops after which he went on the road as a brakeman, and ran as a conductor on special trains for three years. For many years he had been a baggage master on trains Nos. 35 and 36, and was one of the best known men running north out of Moncton. His wife predeceased him eight years ago. The late Mr. Rushton was a man of a kindly heart and had many friends in the province who will learn with regret of his death. For the past several months the deceased had not been on duty as a train man and had been confined to his home by illness and his death was not unexpected. He leaves four brothers and one sister. The brothers are Mr. Enoch W. Rushton, I. R. C. locomotive engineer, and Mr. J. D. Rushton, of the I. R. C. and Chesley Rushton, of the I. R. C. and J. V. Rushton, of Seattle, Washington, and the sister is Mrs. E. Forsythe, of Boston, Mass. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon.

ELIZABETH SIVEWRIGHT.

The death of Mrs. John Sivewright took place at the residence of her niece, Miss Murray, on Sunday. Deceased was eighty-eight years old.

She was Miss Elizabeth Murray, daughter of late William Murray of Chatham Head, architect of St. James church, Newcastle. Mrs. Sivewright died of hemorrhage of the brain. She had been a widow over forty years. Her husband was at one time Principal of Newcastle Grammar school.

Mrs. Sivewright was the mother of eight children, all of whom occupied prominent positions, one John, being M. P. for Gloucester county. Only two children survive: Mrs. Drummond of Buffalo, N. Y., and Miss Emma Sivewright, telephone operator at Chatham. Deceased was one of a family of eight, the last of whom, Mrs. Backler, predeceased her about a year and a half ago.

WILL DEMAND PROHIBITION

The N. B. Temperance Federation Will Interview the Government on January 4th.

St. John, Dec. 29th.—The N. B. Temperance Federation are making excellent progress in securing a large number of signatures to their petitions, which are now circulated all over the province in the interests of prohibition.

The move of Federation is to secure prohibition in the entire province and in their efforts they have secured the co-operation of many individuals, churches and societies interested. The petitions have been out a considerable time and it is now planned to have all of them sent to the meeting to be held here on January 4th. Therefore it would be desirable for all persons having petitions to send them in immediately.

It was first intended to meet the government during exhibition week. However, it is now proposed to meet the government early in January and the federation expects to have a strong backing. Further developments in the matter will be looked for from the government. Whether they will pass a law or call for a plebiscite remains to be seen.
