THE EDUCATIONAL ENQUIRY.

Mr. Justice Patterson's Report. To His Honour Donald A. Macdonald, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario:

In pursuance of Her Majesty's Commission bearing date the 24th day of September, 1877, addressed to me, Christopher Salmon Patterson, one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Court of Appeal, and appointing me a Commissioner to inquire into and report upon the two charges therein set forth—that is to say two charges which, amongst others, had been publicly brought through the medium of newspapers against the Central Committee of Examiners of the Education Department, or certain members of it, viz:—

First—That there is within the Central Committee a Ring, the members of which have dishonourable relations with the publishing house of Adam Miller & Company, of Toronto; and.

Secondly, That in the preparation of examination papers in connection with the Public and High Schools there has been collusion between members of the Central Committee and other parties interested in the work or the result of the examinations.
