THE CARE OF THE RETURNED SOLDIERS.
A good sized public meeting consisting almost entirely of returned soldiers, Mayor Fox presiding, on Wednesday evening, was addressed by Dr. Charles Mackay, Medical Director of the department of Civil Re-establishment of Returned Soldiers, Fredericton.
