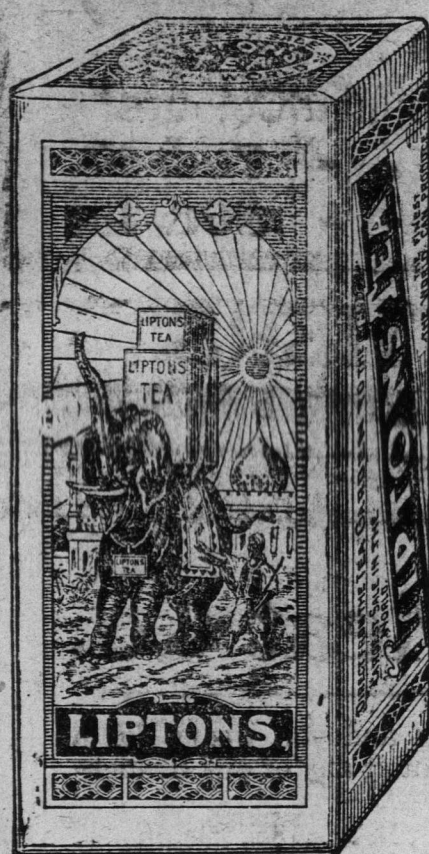

Bride Not
Asked to 'Obey.'First "Spiritual Militant" Wedding—
City Church Ceremony.

The first "spiritual militant" mar-
riage ceremony took place at St.
Ethelburga's Church, Bishopgate, yes-
terday afternoon, when the Rev. Dr.
Cobb, the rector, who officiated, did
not call upon the bride to repeat the
words "obey him and serve him."

The bride was Miss Elizabeth Wet-
zel, daughter of Dr. Stanton Cobb,
and Mrs. Cobb, of Hyde Park Gate,
who were closely associated with the
foundation of the Spiritual Militancy
League for the Women's Charter of
Rights and Liberties, which recently
issued a manifesto on the "moral in-
dignities" contained in the Anglican
marriage service, and the bridegroom
was Mr. Thorsby Gibson, son of Mr.
and Mrs. Arthur Gibson, of Newcastle-
on-Tyne.

The omission of the "obey" clause
was not the only departure from the
usual order of service, for while the
bride—who wore a beautiful wedding
robe of white tulle and lace, the train
of white chiffon bro-
cade being bordered with ermine—
was accompanied up the aisle by her
parents, there was no giving away
ceremony, the clergyman omitting by
special request to put the usual ques-
tion, "Who giveth this woman to be
married to this man?"

Eight little children in picturesque
Kate Greenaway costumes, followed
the bride to the altar. They were
her three sisters, the Misses Adeline,
Isabel, Gwendoline, and Virginia
Cobb; Miss Elizabeth von Gax (cous-
in of the bride), Miss Morgan Gib-
son (cousin of the bridegroom), Mes-
srs. Eddie Garbutt and Masters Derek
and Thurston Martin-Holland.

The bridesmaids wore dainty
gowns of flowery gauze over pale
blue satin, and quaint mob caps of
fine white muslin tied with blue rib-
bons. Instead of carrying bouquets
they had muffs made of natural flow-
ers, while the three small pages wore
pale blue suits.

The promise "to obey" and the
"giving away" ceremony are the two
first "indignities" enumerated in the
manifesto of the spiritual militants.
It is interesting to recall that in the
case of the marriage of Mr. Victor
Duval and Miss Dugdale, which took
place at the Savoy Chapel in January
of last year, the bride and bride-
groom, who are well-known in con-
nection with the Suffragist movement,
expressed a wish that the "obey"
clause should be omitted from the
service. On the morning of the
marriage, the Rev. Hugh Chapman,
who performed the ceremony, decided,
in consideration of the fact that the
ceremony was to take place in one
of the Chapels Royal, that he could
not carry out the plan. The com-
promise then arrived at, was that the
minister should say the words, but
that they should not be repeated by
the bride.

The wedding at St. Ethelburga's
yesterday, therefore, was the first at
which these words were omitted.—

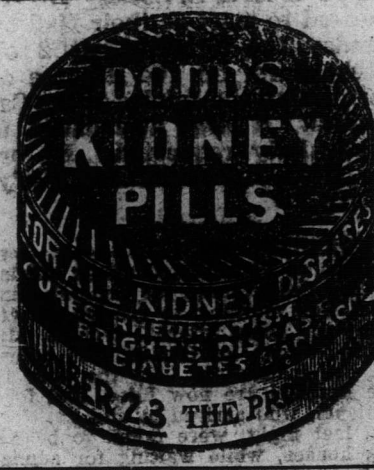
