The Submarine Menace Near.

(Continued from 3rd page.)

NOT WHAT THE GERMANS DID. LONDON, June 3. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Replying to a question in the House of Commons regarding the agreement by the government not to bombard Cologne on Corpus Christi day, Mr. Bonar Law states the appeal of the Vatican had been received by the Anglo-French governments, and the reply in terms already announced had been sent after consultation and in agreement with the French government.

The staff of the Air Ministry had also been consulted. The action of the Germans in shelling Paris despite our undertaking will not be forgotten in the event of any similar appeal being made in the future, the Chancellor stated. Mr. Hall, "Did the Germans undertake that aircraft used in protecting back areas would not be used for bombing ships and troops on Corpus Christi day?" Mr. Bonar Law replied that the Air Ministry was of opinion that German aircraft would not be so used, if only because the idea was too short for an expedition to be made. Replying to further questions Mr. Bonar Law said the decision was taken by the War Cabinet after full consideration of all relevant facts. Mr. Carr, "Was the attention of the Vatican drawn to the Whit Sunday air raid on London, and the Good Friday bombardment of Paris?" Mr. Bonar Law: "No. Obviously the government would have been fully justified in view of the Whit Sunday raid in refusing altogether the appeal. It seemed a peculiar example of German mentality that such a request should have been submitted by the Germans after what occurred, but although it was an impudent request it does not follow it was an unwise British decision." Mr. Herbert S. Samuel: "Were the Germans asked reciprocally to spare places behind the Anglo-French lines?" Mr. Bonar Law: "No. Had we made such a request it would have implied that we were making a bargain, but we were not making a bargain, but doing what we thought right." Mr. Frederick Whyte: "Has the Vatican made any representations to Germany regarding the bombardment of Paris on Good Friday. Mr. Bonar Law: "We are not aware that the Vatican has done so, but we have drawn the attention of the Vatican to the bombardment of Paris on Corpus Christi day."

A CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS. DUBLIN, June 2. The Lord Lieutenant issued a proclamation to-night asking for 20,000 voluntary recruits and thereafter two to three thousand monthly to maintain a division. The first call is to men from 18 to 27 years of age and special inducement is offered of legislation to insure that land shall be available for the men who fight for their country.

Railroads Want Rates Increased.

WASHINGTON, June 3. Canadian railways to-day asked permission of the Interstate Commerce Commission to raise rates on business done on their line within the United States to the level provided by Director General McAdoo under the recent rate orders for American railways. The Canadian Pacific asked for the three cent rate per mile in Maine and Vermont.

ALWAYS PROVIDING RUSSIA IS FRIENDLY. LONDON, June 3. The Germans steadily are rushing the tenacles of their economic control far into Central Asia, where they are buying up available crops, including cotton, and placing orders for many years ahead, says the Daily Chronicle.

The foundation of these developments is in the German control of Roumania and the Ukraine. "The control of the Roumanian and Ukrainian harvests would provide Germany not only with a complete solution of her food problem," the Chronicle adds.

FINLAND UNDER GERMAN CONTROL. LONDON, June 3. A secret convention exists between Germany and Finland, which is kept secret from the Finnish Diet by which the Finnish Government undertakes to establish a monarchy under a German dynasty and to place the Finnish Army under German leadership, according to a despatch to the Times from Stockholm, quoting the socialist newspaper, Politiken, which has

IRISH Fishing Fleet Submarine.

LONDON, June 3. Twelve of a fleet of thirty or forty fishing vessels, which left Irish ports on the night of May 30th, were sunk by a German submarine, says a Belfast despatch to the Daily Telegraph. The submarine suddenly appeared in the midst of the fleet and ordered the fishermen to take to their boats; it then sank the vessels by shelling them. The Irishmen say the submarine was interrupted in its work and submerged, which probably prevented the destruction of the entire fleet. The Irishmen lost all their gear, but there were no casualties.

DRAWN AROUND RHEIMS. LONDON, June 3. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—The Germans have drawn their line close round Rheims and hold three quarters of an armed semi-circle. The British War Office, on aerial operations, issued a Statement Saturday night, reporting a raid on the station and workshops at Karlsruhe. The statement said that one of the machines engaged in the raid failed to return.

ATTACK ON KARLSRUHE. AMSTERDAM, June 3. Four persons were killed, six seriously wounded, and many slightly injured when ten British machines attacked the open town of Karlsruhe at 9 o'clock on Saturday morning, according to the Weeser Zeitung, of Bremen. Two of the British airmen were shot down, it is claimed.

PARIS AGAIN BOMBARDED. PARIS, June 3. The bombardment of the Paris region by the German long range cannon was resumed to-day.

LOCAL SUCCESSES. LONDON, June 3. (Official.) Successful local operations were carried out by our troops last night in the neighborhood of Vieux Berquin and Merris. Our line was advanced slightly at these points, and 193 prisoners and a machine gun and trench mortars have been captured by us. Our casualties were light. Successes resulted in the capture of twenty prisoners, three machine guns and a trench mortar by our south east of Arras, northwest of Lens and west of Merville. A hostile raiding party was repulsed south of Villers Berquin.

HUNS ATTACK WITH FRESH TROOPS. PARIS, June 3. The battle in France was resumed with great intensity during the night and in the course of the day, according to the War Office report this evening. The Germans with fresh troops attacked between the Oise and the Ourcq with redoubled violence. The Germans have been checked west of Soissons, continues the statement and we recaptured Favorelles.

HOSTILE RAIDS REPULSED. LONDON, June 2. Field Marshal Haig's report to-night from British headquarters in France says: Hostile raids were repulsed during the night by French troops east of Bailion.

AERIAL ACTIVITY. LONDON, June 3. The official on aerial operations to-night says: Yesterday our airplanes carried out a good deal of observation for artillery and took many photos. Eighteen tons of bombs were dropped by our airplanes and heavy machine gun fire from the air was directed upon a great variety of targets. Eight enemy machines were destroyed in air fighting and fourteen were driven down out of control. Three of ours are missing. On Sunday night we bombed Le Cateau. St. Quentin and Valenciennes railway stations and dropped eight tons of bombs. All our night flying machines returned.

KING REPLIES. LONDON, June 3. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Replying to birthday congratulations from Field Marshal Haig, King George said: "My heart is more than ever with the troops. I know how splendidly they are now fighting. Come what may the national spirit will carry us through to a triumphant end."
