

Job's Firm Cancelled Coal Cargo.

Most Unwarranted Proceeding.
On Wednesday Sir J. C. Crosbie gave notice that he would ask the Minister of Shipping to lay on the table of the House a copy of all cable correspondence between his Department and the United States Shipping Board, with reference to the importation of a cargo of coal in the month of March.

Yesterday the correspondence was tabled as follows:—

MESSAGES.
February 20, 1920.
United States Shipping Board,
New York.

Your steamer "Orion" here short of coal and unfortunately we have none to give her. It would confer a favour on Newfoundland Government and at same time serve your steamer if you would despatch three thousand tons best household bituminous coal by one of your steamers at a reasonable freight rate, not exceeding six dollars per ton. Since beginning December last our supply has been short due to various causes, but during period we have not refused any your steamers sufficient coal to proceed on journey, although St. John's has been rationed on absolutely smallest necessary requirements and many other towns are without supplies. Your Government has been trying to induce your Government to place coal here for bunkering United States steamers, but so far without result. Only two weeks' supplies here and no tonnage available; hope therefore in mutual interest you will be able to rush a cargo here. We would take over balance at cost price.

Re telegram second instant, arrangements to send forward Lake Belnora with coal cargo have been cancelled on the request of Job Company, and advice from that company and cargo of coal can be obtained that source more promptly. They also agree to use every effort to obtain sufficient bunkers for "Orion" to reach destination, or if this impossible, sufficient to reach closest bunkering port. Request your assistance in obtaining bunkers this vessel and in turn will do all possible to obtain release gas coal for your gas company. Advise prospects K.M. sixty one.

Your message third. Job's action seems unwarranted. We were willing help out position by taking part cargo "Belnora" costing nine dollars more than our ordinary supply and saleable only at loss. Unable to get sufficient supplies from Louisiana and our coast situation so bad that bunkering "Orion" altogether impossible, as this would necessitate closing down industries to provide coal for householders, who are very strictly rationed. Your Navy Department had coal stored here but sold it locally. Advised your Consul here two months ago what was likely to occur, and understand he urged United States Authorities to store bunker coal here but without result. Hitherto have bunkered your steamers under great strain to stocks, and when "Orion" advised coming here wirelessly Captain we could not bunker him. Coal steamers afraid come here before middle of April owing ice conditions. Hope Job's having undertaken to help you will be successful.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

BATESVILLE, Ark., April 22. Flames swept through the residence section of Batesville yesterday afternoon and destroyed eighty residences, made three hundred persons homeless, and caused a loss estimated at half a million dollars.

MASSACHUSETTS WILL NOT BE DRY.

BOSTON, April 22. A bill to legalize the sale, in this state, of beers and light wines with alcoholic contents of not more than 2.75 per cent, was passed by the Senate yesterday, with a vote of 21 to 8. The measure has not yet been acted upon by the House.

UNIQUE CAUSE FOR STRIKE.

JAEN, Spain, April 22. All workers here struck to-day, because of a quarrel between the Socialist Mayor of the city and the Civil Governor, which arose from the former's suppression of gambling, which action the Governor declared was not authorized. The workmen generally support the Mayor's action and the city is without water, gas, electricity or street cars.

FAVORABLE SENTIMENT.

LONDON, April 22. England's new Irish Policy may be something broader than the existing Home Rule Scheme, and not unlike Dominion Home Rule, says the Daily Sketch. Sir Hamar Greenwood, recently named Chief Secretary for Ireland, and General Sir Cecil A. T. Macready, the newly appointed Military Commander there, are said to favor moderation and are making attempts to determine just what the Sinn Fein wants. A favorable atmosphere is being created and a Government newspaper says it will go further to reach a settlement than is generally believed.

OVERALL PARADE FOR NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, April 22. Ten thousand persons, at least, will parade here on Saturday in overall, according to estimates to-day by the "Cheese Club," which is fostering a drive against the high prices of clothing. It will be an "All Overall" parade from the police, who will head the procession, to bands and marchers. The price cutting movement by department stores, which started in Brooklyn, spread to Manhattan to-day, with an announcement by A. W. Riely, Head of the Department of Justice Flying Squadron of Profiteer Hunters, that two big stores have volunteered to cut clothing and shoe prices. He said one was a large Fifth Avenue Department Store.

SEEDING TEAMS ORGANIZED.

CALGARY, April 23. Mobilization of all available teams of the cities of this Province to assist in seeding operations, is being planned by the U. F. A. in co-operation with Southern Boards of Trade. The Mayor and Commissioners, and many business men have approved of the idea. It is estimated that seeding could be assisted to the extent of two thousand acres a day in Southern Alberta, if two hundred teams could be secured from Calgary, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat.

JAMAICA GINGER ON TRIAL.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., April 23. The question whether Jamaica Ginger is a prohibited beverage under United States Law, is to be tried out in the Federal Court here. A vendor of ginger went on trial yesterday.

LONG SENTENCES FOR RIOTERS.

JERUSALEM, April 23. The British Commander here has confirmed sentences passed by court martial, mainly under the Ottoman Penal Code, on several Arabs and Jews in connection with the Easter rioting. The sentences range from fifteen years imprisonment downward. The Jews kept their shops closed Tuesday morning in protest, but reopened them on the Government's order. The total casualties in the rioting are announced as 198.

GERMAN OBSTRUCTION.

PARIS, April 23. General Masterman, a member of the Entente Commission of Control in Germany, in a report made public yesterday, severely arraigned Germany.

SMALL SUM ON ACCOUNT.

BERLIN, April 23. Germany will announce before May 10, the amount she is able to pay as part of her indemnity to the Allies. The Finance Minister has not yet definitely indicated the sum, but it is hinted that the amount will be below a hundred thousand marks.

NEWSPAPER CONTROLS ADMINISTRATION.

LONDON, April 23. Sir John Taylor, Under Secretary in the Irish Administration, will resign as a part of the new Government policy towards Ireland, says the Daily Sketch. Sir John, says the newspaper, has for years been the power behind the Throne at Dublin Castle, and his life has been in constant danger. He was constantly guarded by detectives, and it is reported he had not left the Castle in six months until he was given a months leave of absence recently. This leave may be prolonged indefinitely.

CHANGING HIS MIND.

PARIS, April 23. Premier Lloyd George, of Great Britain, would approve of an Anglo-French occupation of the Ruhr district of Germany, in the event that the Berlin Government should refuse to live up to revised terms of the Versailles Treaty, says "Pettinax," political editor of the Echo de Paris.

DINED FRENCH PREMIER.

SAN REMO, April 22. Premier Millerand, of France, was the guest of honor at a dinner given by Premier Lloyd George, of Great Britain last night. A. J. Balfour, former British Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, was present.

SUMMARY OF FOREIGN EVENTS.

HORSEA, April 23. (British Wireless Service.) LONDON.—Japan has declared war on Soviet Russia, and America has given Japan a free hand in Siberia, says a Harbin despatch to the Daily Herald. From Harnac Mancuria States, a witness has arrived here, and confirms a report that the Japanese, last Sunday, fired on the barracks of the American engineers near the scene of the fighting at Hariaf, between the Japanese and the Czechs. There were no casualties among the American ranks.

WASHINGTON.—The big league baseball season opened here to-day when the Red Sox and the Nationals clashed on the second series of this year. The opening was one of the most suspicious the capital has ever had. Vice President Marshall shied off the first ball. Brilliant games are recorded. Secretary Daniels and party were in the box and with him were half a score of high ranking naval officers.

Baseball Scores.—The American League: Chicago, eight; Detroit two; Washington, eight; Boston, five; New York, eight; Philadelphia, eleven; St. Louis, three. The National League: Philadelphia, four; Brooklyn, three; Chicago four; Cincinnati three; New York and Boston, St. Louis and Pittsburgh were postponed, owing to rain.

Temple, Texas.—James E. Ferguson, former Governor of Texas, yesterday announced his candidacy for President of the United States on the platform of the American party, which was organized at Fort Worth, Texas, last August by a fraction of the Texas Democratic Party.
